CANADA'S RAILWAYS

(Times Special Correspondence.)
London, June 30—Canadians are so often accused of being unduly optimistic regarding the performance and future of the dominion that it is refreshing to find that much of the praise of Canada and Canadian undertakings comes from competent observers from other countries who cannot be accused of that form of patriotism.

In Canada, too, he says, are most efficient, and the rates are not as a rule higher than those of the Australian governments, whose service is, however, of such a character that one can only apologize for it.

It is the same with telegraphs in Australia, which are all government owned, and recently the hours at which a telegram could be sent were reduced by two and the offices are now open only from nine to six. Altogether, according to this authority, Canadians may feel that they are a great deal better off than the Australians.

IN FRENCH LINES

A French model, it can be reproduced for about \$1.50.

Very good quality French linens may be bought for 25 cents a yard. If it is 28 inches wide 4 1/2 yards will be needed for this design. It is trimmed entirely with its own material.

The dress is made without a lining and requires but a short time to put together. First the under-arm seam is closed; then the shoulder seam, taking care to match the notches perfectly. The center of the front is indicated by large "O" perforations. Gather lower edge of waist between double "T" perforations. Sew Japanese collar to neck edge and standing collar to shield as notched. Adjust shield, corresponding large "O" perforations in shield and in front even. Close out with a notched, saw to sleeve as notched, seams even.

For the skirt, slash to left of center-front to double "O" perforations for opening. Close center-back seam. Turn hem at lower edge on double "O" perforations. First, creating a line of slot perforations, bring folded edges to corresponding lines of small "O" perforations and bring folded edge near center-back to center; press pleats. Sew to lower edge of waist centers even, large "O" perforation at under-arm seams.

Trim with a fabric of the same material and fancy buttons.

Hints for the Cook

Suet Pudding.
One cup chopped suet, one cup sour milk, one teaspoon soda, two eggs, two cups raisins, currants or berries, one teaspoon salt, two teaspoons cinnamon, one ground nutmeg, quarter cup molasses, half cup brown sugar and flour to make stiff. Steam four hours. Served in slices with hard sauce or cream. This can be steamed one hour and then put into a fireless cooker for four hours.

Cream Sponge Cake.
Beat two eggs five minutes by the clock, add one cup of sugar and beat again, add one cup sifted flour, in which has been sifted one teaspoon baking
