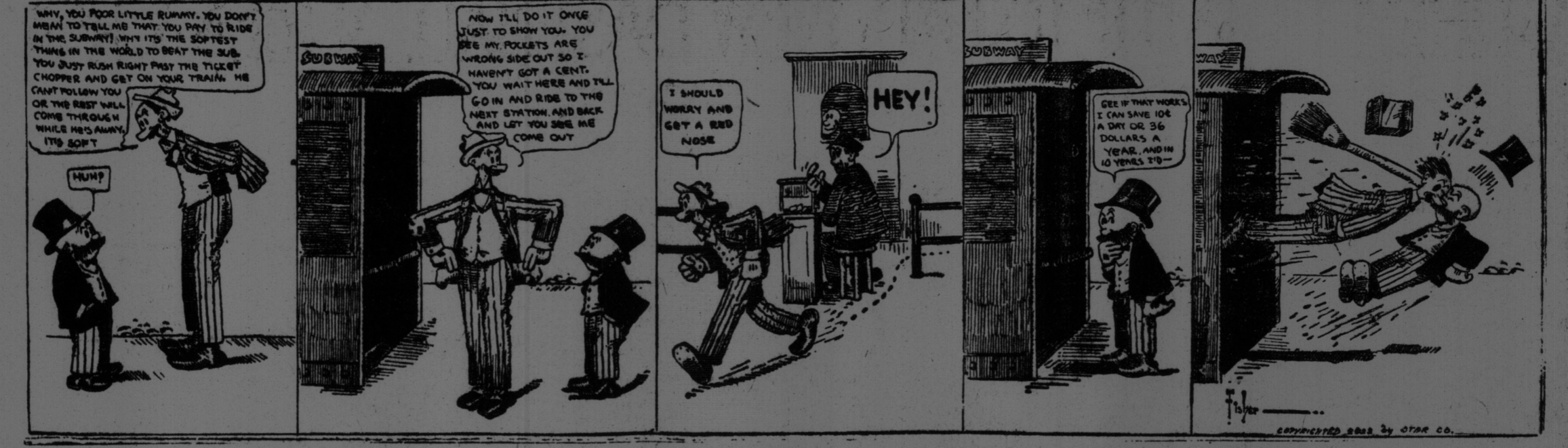
Pitcher Wheatley, of the Detroit Americans, was yesterday released to the Providence Club, of the International league.
