



BUOYS OUT OF PLACE ADD TO HAZARD

FOR SHIPPING OFF NEW ENGLAND

Boston, Feb. 27—Acting on instructions from Secretary of
the Navy Denby, officers of the First Naval District here last night
took steps to secure additional tugs and dynamite to force open
ice-bound harbors on the Massachusetts coast. There was an appeal by the mayors of thirty-nine Massachusetts cities to have the
Cape Cod Canal kept open so that movement of coal might be expected.

Navigation is being hindered off the New England coast, shipping men said, by the fact that many buoys have been released by
ice floes, and the element of hazard of running aground has been
added to the difficulties of penetrating the ice.
