

### DOUBT ARISES RE VOCATIONAL SCHOOL BILLS

Are Expenditures to Come  
Out of General As-  
essment?

### LEGAL OPINION TO BE SECURED

Trustees to Ask Attorney-  
General For Decision On  
Reading of Act.

The question of whether the ex-  
penditures for vocational education are  
to be covered by the general assess-  
ment for schools or are to be provided  
through separate assessment was con-  
sidered at the meeting of the Board of  
School Trustees last night and it was  
decided to ask the ruling of the At-  
torney-General as to the reading of the  
Vocational Education Act is vague.

Dr. L. M. Curran, M.L.A., chairman,  
presided. Others present were Trust-  
ees Mrs. E. R. Taylor and Mrs. D. P.  
Chisholm, G. H. Green, Stephen W.  
Palmer, Thomas Nagle, E. R. W. In-  
gram, Allan A. McIntyre, H. Colby  
Smith, S. A. Worrell, acting-superin-  
tendent, and A. Gordon Leavitt, sec-  
retary.

### Vocational Act.

Replying to a query, the chief su-  
perintendent of education, Dr. W. S. Car-  
ter, wrote he understood any assess-  
ment for vocational education was  
apart from the assessments for schools  
and was not limited nor need it come  
within the \$400,000 which was author-  
ized for school assessment. It was de-  
cided to ask the Attorney-General to  
give his interpretation of the wording  
of the Act which is not clear, and it  
was pointed out that vocational as-  
essment must come within the school  
assessment it will be necessary to have  
the Legislature authorize a higher as-  
essment than is now provided.

### Want More Money.

The Free Kindergarten Association  
wrote that it was necessary to raise  
about \$500 a year to supplement the  
School Board grant of \$5,000 and  
asked the Board to assume this addi-  
tional expense. The matter was hotly  
discussed, Mr. Green saying the board  
had no right to assume the responsi-  
bility in the first instance and had  
better abandon it now. It was decided  
to have the chairman and secretary to  
reply to the effect that since the kin-  
dergartens had been a volunteer move-  
ment the board had already assumed  
as large an expenditure as it could at  
this time. The \$5,000 for kindergar-  
tens has been provided for in the es-  
timate. Dr. Curran considered the kin-  
dergartens to be social service work  
rather than educational work but said  
he felt it was very well worth the  
money.

### Electric Lighting.

The Power Commission of St. John  
sent a further communication asking  
for the entire contract for electricity  
for the schools and Dr. Curran spoke  
in support of the request. The coun-

### Secretary's Report.

The secretary's report gave statis-  
tics for the month as follows: Pupils  
enrolled, 8,691; boys, 4,248, and girls,

attendance, 90.89, and teachers' visits,  
251.

### Building Committee.

Mr. Nagle requested an early meet-  
ing of the buildings committee, as he  
said there were matters of importance  
pending, including the appointment of  
a building inspector and the matter of  
St. Patrick's school. A special meet-  
ing was then decided on for Feb. 23.  
A recommendation from a special com-  
mittee that rental be paid for Alex-  
andra school site was adopted.

Authority was given to call for ten-  
ders for the printing of the board's re-  
ports for the last four years. Mr. Leav-  
itt suggested that a vault be secured  
for the keeping of the records since 1878.

### Trauant Officer.

Boyd McMann, truant officer, re-  
ported for January that he had super-  
vision of 101 cases of irregular attend-  
ance and eight cases of truancy. He  
also visited 106 homes and 14 schools.

He found many cases of children being  
kept home from lack of necessities for  
living. He had secured assistance for  
some of the most serious cases.



that was nicely served.


### Illinois Florist Gets Life Sentence




