Toronto, Nov. 24.—The official nom-inations for Centre Toronto took place here yesterday and O. A. Howland, Conservative, and George Bertram, Lib-eral, were formally placed in the field. The election will take place next Tuesday. Mr. Howland's resignation as M. P. P. for South Toronto, has been placed in the hands of Speaker Evanturel, and South Toronto is now vacant. From the Estate of Mrs Cawthra- Alleged Contession by a Dead Murberer in lexas

She was Worth \$4,000,000- How the That he Committed the Crimes for

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 24.—It is understood that the Province of Ontario will receive about \$400,000 death dues from the estate of the late Mrs. Cawthra Murray. The estate is valued at \$4,000,000. Cawthra Mulock, son of Postmaster-General Mulock, is the heir. He is about 15 years of age. Among the bequests are: — Mrs. Mulock, wife of William Mulock, Postmaster-General, \$50,000; Mrs. Ryerson, wife of Dr. G. S. Ryerson, \$50,000; W. C. Crowther, \$50,000; to be invested for the benefit of the children of James Crowther, \$50,000; Mrs. William Murray, \$2,000. Cawthra Mulock is to receive 10 per cent. of the income when he reaches the age of 21 years, and the whole of the income when he becomes 25 years of age. Should he die without issue before he becomes of age the estate is to be divided between Postmaster-General Mulock and his wife, Mrs. Ryerson and W. C. Crowther. Postmaster-General Mulock is appointed the sole executor and trustee.

Morgan, Texas, Nov. 24.—In March last was noted the death of Joseph E. Blanther, alias Forbes, who suicided in the Meridian jail in this county on March 2. But developments of the past few days bring to light even a more startling crime, of which he is self-confessed, than was the murder of Mrs. Langfeldt, for which he was hunted. While Blanther was incarcerated in the Meridian jail, there was also a fellow prisoner named Pitts, who occupied the cell adjoining that of Blanther. In a letter to Word, Dillar & Word, attorneys, of Meridian, under date of Nov. 22, Pitts incloses a letter from Blanther, and says:

"I have been looking through some papers that I had on file in jail at Meridian, and I find the inclosed sheet which speaks for itself. The papers alluded to here worked through a hole in my pocket, hence the delay in not discovering them sooner. I well remember that Forbes or Blanther, asked me the evening he took the poison at night which coat was mine of several that were hanging in the cell he occupied. I never thought further of the question he asked until I found the letter he wrote. I send it to you for the reason you best know who to notify in Galifornia. I hope that it may be worth something to you in the way of saving Durrant of Cabifornia, who, I understand, is sentenced to death for killing Miss Lamont." Following is Blanther's letter:

Rt. Hon. Charles Ritchie, president of the board of trade, in an important speech before the Chamber of Commerce of Croydon, took as his themse the decline of British exports during the last ten months, upon which he, hung a grave warning against American competition, now "ousting British trade."
