Gregori, who fired upon Major Dreyfus during the ceremonies last June, incident to the placing of the body of Emile Zola in the Pantheon, the Dreyfus affair, which has divided France into two parties for the last 12 years, may be said to have been buried beyond all possibility of

Grand Turk, Turks Island, B. W. I. Sept. 12.—A hurricane of great fury swept over Turk's Island on Thursday night and yesterday morning, and at

Grave anxiety is felt for the safety of Dr. R. T. Robertson, district com-missioner of Caicos, who was making a tour of the islands when the storm broke.

The hurricane reached here at 9 o'clock on Thursday night, the wind blowing from the northeast. At 4 o'clock this morning the wind had reached a velocity of nearly 100 miles an hour and was blowing from the northeast.

Much damage has been done to property here and the streets of Grand Turk are a mass of wreckage. Trees have been uprooted, portions of buildings blown away, and many houses have been partially wrecked.

The Haytien sloop, Telegraph, which had taken shelter at Hawk's Nest, foundered with all hands. The schooner Don Leon, belonging to the East Calcos Fibre Company, broke away from her anchorage and has not been seen since.
