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## Circular Letter.

Beloved Brethren.

The subject of this our annual address is Holiness. mean that holiness which should be developed by christians, in the purity of their character, and propriety of their conduct. There are other terms in Theology which convey to us the same idea with holiness; or if indeed there is a distinction of meaning, it is so faint that we shall not attempt to define; those terms are 'pure,' as required in christian purity; and 'perfect' as God's people should be perfect. Our conceptions of holiness originate in our knowledge of the attribute of holiness in the Deity. We learn that God is holy from general manifestations of his purity; especially from his moral law; from sacrificial declarations, and requisitions; and mainly from the substitution of Christ, comprising the perfection of his life, and involving the agonies of the garden, and the cross. All our knowled, e of God is in harmony with the more perfect knowledge of angels, who continually cry, Holy, Holy, Holy is the
