STOCK PRICES GO DOWN WITH HEAVY CRASH

Deeper Causes Underlying Heavy Break

UNSTABLE CONDITIONS

Mushroom Growth Following Recovery from Panic in 1907 Now Crumbling Away -- Union Pacific Hard Hit.

New York, N. Y., June 30.—So violent a crash in prices of stocks as that which culminated today, is not to be explained by the surface causes which have been advanced from day to day, such as the impaired spring wheat prospect, the reduction of railroad rates on the transcontinental railroads ordered by the interstate commerce commission and similar explanations. Deeper causes are indicated and were sought by inquirers in the financial world today.

From the high points of last Thursday, Union Pacific sold today at a decline of 20 points and from that maximum there were varying losses through the whole list of active stocks. The June 1 advance followed the agreement reached between President Taft and the railroad presidents to submit the proposed rate advances to the operation of the new railroad law and the movement by the representatives of the great banks to assents from the freight passenger interest to the proposed freight rate advance.

The stock market of today and yesterday showed how drastic a readjustment remained to be made. Probable dividend reductions by some of the railroads were discussed as events foreshadowed from the action of the stock market.

The outcome confirms the conviction of the unstable conditions which were the outcome of the premature rush of the recovery from the crisis of three years ago.

There has been a conviction that extensive commitments in speculative holdings of stocks which were carried through the culmination of last year's rise in October have been obstinately held ever since in the faith that each down turn in the market was a simple reaction destined to be followed by a resumption of the march of progress.

The process proved a painful one, and involved convulsive price adjustments. The drop in wheat was accompanied by reports of beneficial rains in the drought stricken districts of the northwest. Private estimates of the cotton crop were held to foreshadow a good government report of condition tomorrow.

Money on call went no higher than 3 1/2 per cent, in spite of the disturbance of loans called with today's impairment of margins. The substantial recovery under the strong tone of the closing was taken as promise that the storm had spent its force so far as the stock market is concerned.

Bonds were weak. Total sales, par value, \$3,350,000. U. S. bonds were unchanged on call.

IMPORTANCE OF AGRICULTURE

Dr. Brittain Delivered an Important Address on Agricultural Education Before the Teachers' Institute Yesterday

Yesterday's session of the Educational Institute of New Brunswick opened as usual at 9:30 o'clock. The first business before the meeting was the selecting for an executive committee which resulted in the return of the following names: Mr. Myles, Miss Thorne, Mr. Owens, Mr. De Long, Miss Wilson, Miss Belyea, Mr. Mercer, Miss Knight, Miss Oulton and Mr. Anderson.

Mr. W. J. S. Myles was elected to the senate of the University of New Brunswick. Dr. John Brittain, professor of Nature Study, MacDonald College, delivered a brief, but interesting address on the subject of Agricultural Education.

Dr. Brittain opened his address with the question, "Shall we allow our country children to grow up acting on the rule of survival of the fittest? We must teach our children to be home-makers."

"Reading, writing and arithmetic are not the only essentials of modern life," continued the Doctor. "These are the tools of the trade, the tools of life than good eyesight, health and happy homes are more to be desired. Let us cultivate the essentials for these in our schools. If school for the first two years of the preparation for life, we must impart to the children a knowledge of sanitary principles. The birds return in the spring to the country, and their songs are as divine as those of the angels, but more easy to bear. A garden should be found in connection with every school, and the main principals of plant culture taught to the children as a part of their present day life."

"Much may be done in the schools without a garden, by window boxes, etc., and the care of the plants will give a knowledge and interest in the subject. The Inspector of the day will not stay on the farm for the sake of the money to be made, nor will the young women, their ideals being changed before the country home will possess an important part of their life. Modern conveniences are doing much to lessen the antipathy for country life, now so common, but a sentiment for the country is also desired."

Inspector Steeves expressed his pleasure in hearing Dr. Brittain once more. He agreed with Dr. Brittain that the country is the country to the tendency was from the country to the city. In the primary grades the pupils are coming direct from free and easy nature. They are confined to school-room work. He turns to sharp corner when he first enters school. No wonder there is trouble in compelling them to remain still in their seats. Dr. Brittain stated that he did not agree with Inspector Steeves' statement that the contents from the country had increased; he was rather rather inclined to take the contrary view of the case. The country schools had now much improved, and he even knew of one case where a man had taken his children to the country to be educated.

Mr. W. W. Hubbard, Secretary of Agriculture for New Brunswick, was asked to give his views on the subject. Mr. Hubbard spoke of the problem of maintaining the balance of population in the country as a vexed question. He wished to emphasize that the country cannot be the key of the matter rested in the home. The teachers of this province do not receive sufficient remuneration, but the time is surely coming when this reproach cannot be made against us. The ordinary country home of the present day in this province could not be duplicated in the city for \$500 per year. Although there are certain inconveniences connected with country life, these homes are the bulwarks of our country. In conclusion, Mr. Hubbard wished to exhort the teachers to impress on the minds of our citizens the economic importance of the farm, rather than to allow them to fall into the hands of an alien race, as they must surely do if we allow them to remain idle. Inspector Carter said that his ex-

perience was that the influence of nature and agricultural study in this province had been most disappointing, and had been shamelessly neglected. A leaflet had been recently circulated among the teachers dealing with this matter, and its use had been attended with most satisfactory results. At the present time we have no means of providing our teachers with elementary agricultural training, but this fault is hoped to be remedied in the near future. A systematic study of farm weeds would be most beneficial. There is no better country in the world for mixed farming than this province.

Boston, June 30.—Congressman Eugene H. Foss received a delegation of newspaper men on his return from Washington.

"I am not a candidate for further political honors," he said. "I consider that my work has been accomplished in that I stood for an idea and have at last aroused the people so that they have spoken an emphatic word to Congress."

It had been understood that Mr. Foss would not run again in the Eleventh District, but plans had been made this year to give him the Democratic nomination for Governor. Mr. Foss declared that as James F. Walsh, who has run several times and been defeated, had refused to withdraw, his entrance would only split the Democratic party, and he would have no hand in any such plan.

ENCOURAGE BEE KEEPING IN PROVINCE

English Expert Has Been Giving Lessons

HELPS FRUIT RAISING

Plans of Bee Hives and Descriptions on File at Department of Agriculture at Fredericton.

Fredericton, June 30.—The increased interest in fruit raising has turned the attention of fruit growers to the necessity of having bees to fertilize the blossoms. Market gardeners also find that in connection with many kinds of vegetables, such as cucumbers, tomatoes, etc., the presence of bees is very important to get fruit.

During the past winter, in response to invitations, the department of agriculture having fortunately been able to secure the services of Mr. C. E. Taylor, expert bee keeper, late of England, has sent him to various points in the province where he gave a short course in bee keeping and instructions in building up to date hives. Mr. Taylor first went to Queenstown, Queens County, at the invitation of Mr. S. L. Peters and others of that place. Here he had a large and enthusiastic class, a number of which he has taken home to work and built their own bee hives under instructions from Mr. Taylor. Later similar classes received instruction at Central Norton, the manual training room of that place being used. Here also a number of the manual training students built hives from models furnished by the instructor.

Shortly after this the trustees of the Hampton Consolidated School, where a few hives of bees are kept, invited Mr. Taylor to give a course at that institution. Here, as elsewhere, great interest was manifested not only by the scholars and teachers of the school but by a number of residents of the town and country surrounding.

Plans Prepared. Considerable demand having arisen for plans for hives such as Mr. Taylor advocated, which are built in accordance with the specifications of the British Bee-keeper's Association, Mr. Taylor prepared working plans of his hives and blue prints of these are now available at the department of agriculture for all bona fide bee keepers or intending bee keepers. A set of 25 cents is asked for these drawings to show the bona fides of the applicant. Mr. Taylor demonstrated his hive in the city market at Fredericton and in response to requests he was sent by the department on a driving tour through the parishes of Kingsclear, Bright and Douglas, where he visited bee keepers at their homes, examined their hives and broods and gave such instruction as the occasion demanded. The last place to visit Mr. Taylor's services was Manguerville and he has just returned from a week's instruction given there.

Mr. Taylor is now preparing to go to Florida, where he owns land, for the purpose of breeding a supply of bees during the coming fall and winter, with the idea of shipping several hundred stocks to this province next spring for sale to those who wish to go into bee keeping. This is a private venture Mr. Taylor's business is proposed if there is then a demand for his services, that arrangements will be made whereby he can give instructions in various districts. It is understood that Mr. A. A. Tremblay of Manguerville will furnish a depot for the receipt of the bees next spring, where they can be procured.

Any enquiries from intending bee keepers may be addressed to the department of agriculture Fredericton, N. B., and arrangements will be made so that full information may be given. If New Brunswick is to become, as it may, a great fruit growing country, there is no question but that bees must go along with the expansion of the fruit industry, and every effort will be made by the department to facilitate the work of those who intend to take up bee keeping. The department will be glad to hear from any persons in the province who are making a specialty of raising bees for sale and will be glad to give their business publicity when they are able to show that they have a clean bill of health and that they are using modern, up to date methods with hives and supplies.

BOUTROS ASSASSIN PAYS THE PENALTY

Cairo, June 30.—Ibrahim Wardani, the assassin of Boutros Pasha Ghali, the Egyptian premier and minister of foreign affairs, was hanged Tuesday.

Wardani was an Egyptian student and a member of the National list party. Last February he shot the premier as the latter was leaving the ministry of foreign affairs. His victim died on the following day.

At his trial the murderer said his motive was to avenge various acts of the government which the Nationalists attributed to Boutros Pasha personally.

In the course of his visit there, Roosevelt addressed the students of the university of Cairo, and roundly denounced the assassination, saying that those who condoned the act stood on a pinnacle of evil and infamy.
