chored in the stream until this morning.

The Sicilian sailed from Glasgow on  
April 16 and arrived off Cape Race  
the first of this week. She passed  
into the Gulf and went within 500  
miles of Father Point and there en-  
countered heavy ice closely packed.

The wind at the time was north east,  
and in the hope of finding open water  
to the north, Captain Tannack steam-  
ed 80 miles to the north, but could  
not find an opening and then decided  
to come to Halifax to land the passen-  
gers. The 940 passengers will be  
landed this morning and sent to Mon-  
real by train.—Thursday's Halifax  
Chronicle.
