rived here Friday morning, C. B. Balton,  
Capt. The ship has a cargo of 7,570 tons of coal  
for the Grand Trunk. Her cargo is 18  
tons larger than the one she landed  
here a fortnight ago, and with the  
exception of three cargoes brought  
here from the other side during the  
great strike ten years ago, is the  
largest ever landed here. This is the  
last time the steamer will come here  
this spring, her next run being to  
Montreal, Cape Scott, reports pass-  
ing great quantities of field ice off  
Sydney and around Scatterie, and was  
obliged to skirt the shore for the  
largest vessel to clear it. The ice  
extended for miles and some of it was  
six to seven feet thick—Portland Ar-  
gus.
