

# THREE LOSE LIVES IN HEAVY ELECTRIC STORM IN N.E.

## TWO WOMEN AND SOLDIER KILLED BY HEAVY STORM

### Building in Which Fourteen Women Sought Shelter at Danvers, Mass., Collapses — Artilleryman Killed by Lightning at Boxford and Twenty Other Soldiers Shocked—Heavy Damage to Crops.

Boston, July 29.—Electric storms in New England have played havoc in many places, causing several deaths and doing much damage to crops and other property. Misses Eliza Currier and Lillian Fletcher of Middleton were killed and twelve other women were injured when an unfinished house at Danvers, in which they sought shelter from a thunder storm, was blown from its foundations. One of the injured women, Mrs. George Smith, is on the dangerous list at the Peabody Hospital. The injuries of the others are not serious.

The wind tore the building from its supports, carrying it a distance of fifteen feet and leaving the women in the midst of the wreckage. Miss Currier and Miss Fletcher were crushed by heavy pieces of joist. The former was a nurse and the latter a librarian.

Full grown trees were uprooted by the storm and many of the Danvers streets became impassable. A fire broke out during the storm, but the Danvers department was unable to get through the streets and the department from Peabody had to go over and extinguish the blaze.

## FREDERICTON NATIVE GETS APPOINTMENT

### Prof. Brydone-Jack Superintendent of Engineering for Western Canada — Wheat Exports to U. S. Prohibited.

Ottawa, July 29.—Canadian Press.—Hon. Frank Oliver, in the commons yesterday afternoon, asked for a government statement in regard to the report in the morning newspapers to the effect that the board of grain supervisors had fixed the price of wheat at \$2.40 per bushel and prohibited the export to the United States.

Sir George Foster replied that the price of \$2.40 per bushel applies to wheat of last year's crop and not for the present crop. It having been ascertained that wheat was being taken from the elevator and sent across the border where the price of wheat had not been fixed, an order had been issued prohibiting export of wheat from the Mountain penitentiary, is to be released.

Hon. C. J. Doherty said that representations had been made to the government asking for his release but that nothing definite had yet been decided.

### Germans Heavily Retaliate to Bombardment from Gunners from Dominion.

## TRENCH MORTAR HAMPERS ENEMY

### Canadian Airmen Do Gallant Work in Reprising Operations of Germans.

Canadian Headquarters in France, via London, July 28.—(By Stewart Lyon, Special Correspondent of the Canadian Press).—During the past two days the artillery action on the front has increased in volume, until at times it has reached the dimensions of drum-fire. The enemy's retaliation to our bombardment has been on several occasions, extremely prompt and heavy. The object of his artillery has been to divert the attention of our guns, efforts of enemy working parties to restore their defences have been prevented by a steady trench mortar bombardment. In this, as in other branches of the artillery there has been a remarkable development. Some of the trench mortar projectiles now in use have almost as much high explosive in them as an ordinary 15-inch howitzer shell. The destruction wrought by them in the trenches is very great.

There was another heavy projection of gas into the German trenches west of Lens yesterday with little result.

The start of the enemy's aerial activity on this part of the front has ceased and only a few of his planes have tried to cross our lines. This result has been brought about by hard fighting on the part of the splendid young fellows of the aerial service. One of the most successful aviators in this area is an Ontario man, who has a record of thirty-six German machines brought down most of them from such a height as to ensure their destruction. He has already won the Military Cross and the D.S.O.

## BRITISH SUBMARINE TAKES HUN STEAMER

### The Batavia Captured in North Sea After Short Chase and Later Sunk.

London, July 29.—A British submarine, while patrolling the North Sea, on Friday, overhauled and captured, after a short chase, the German steamship Batavia II, according to an official announcement made at the Admiralty tonight. The German crew abandoned the vessel owing to damage by gunfire. A British prize crew took charge. It was impossible to bring the Batavia into port and she was sunk by opening her sea valves.

Norwegians Sunk.

London, July 28.—The Norwegian steamer Thorvald, (2,200 tons gross), has been sunk by a German submarine. Twenty members of the crew were rescued.

The sailing vessel Vaarbada also has been sunk.

## HUN MILITARY POWER WANING

### Sir Eric Geddes Says German Army Morale Assuredly Is Going Fast.

London, July 28.—"The destruction of the German military power is progressing more since last spring than the people imagine, and the morale of the German army assuredly is going fast," said Sir Eric Geddes, in his first public speech as first lord of the admiralty in the Guildhall at Cambridge tonight. As to his own attitude he said he would not interfere with the needs of the fleet.

## FOUND STRANDED

### Schooner Floated Later.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 29.—The schooner Sylph, coal laden, bound from Sydney for Summerside, ran too close to St. Peter's Island and stranded. Word that an unknown vessel was ashore was forwarded to this city and a tug carried a life boat and crew to the scene.

The schooner was found to be deserted and foundering on a bar. She was floated by the tug and towed to the harbor here.

While the lifesavers were floating the craft the crew of the Sylph came here and reported what they supposed was the loss of their vessel. Unable to float her unaided they launched their boat and rowed to this city. The cargo may be disposed of in Charlottetown and the vessel examined.

## MAINE AND PROVINCIAL OFFICERS CO-OPERATE

### To Enforce Prohibition—Liquor Stores Raided and Liquor Seized.

Chief Inspector Wilson was in the city Saturday and expressed himself as well pleased with the enforcement of the prohibition law up to the present time. He had just made a tour of the province and found the law being observed as well all over as it was in St. John. While away he had made arrangements with the High Sheriff of Maine to cooperate with the New Brunswick officers in Victoria and Madawaska, and all the line houses had been closed up.

Two well known liquor stores Bowdoin and Knapp and Mullins had recently been raided. From the first named place had been taken 75 cases of liquor and from the latter two team loads.

## BEER LICENSES.

Under the prohibitory law it will not be necessary for any person who wishes to sell soda water or aerated waters or any drink which does not contain alcohol to obtain a beer license, as these apply only to such drinks as have more or less alcohol in their composition.
