### CONDEMNS CERTAIN PARTS OF JONES' BILL

Some Sections of the American Shipping Act Declared to be Retaliatory and Discriminatory.

(The Associated Press.) London, July 25.—The Jones bill characterized as "America's bid for shipping supremacy" is denounced by the shipping expert of the Sunday Observer as "retaliatory and discriminatory."

... feeling of most bitter jealousy against our mercantile marine. These two countries are France and the United States. The writer declares that there is nothing to which foreigners can object in the principal provisions of the Jones bill except as it is intended to coordinate the transport functions of the United States with those of the countries of inland shipping, railways, ports and docks so as to form one immense undertaking to force American export and import trade into the hands of American ships. He says, however, that some of the clauses of the bill were intended to be discriminatory against Great Britain and Japan. Among these he mentions those which authorize preferential treatment to American vessels in American ports. The insurance provisions of the bill, he says, impose the most drastic forms of return, which are based absolutely upon the methods of the German insurance companies, against which America herself protested so bitterly previous to her entry into the war. These have been revised accordingly for the purpose of "retaliating every iota of back-

... nos transacted by foreign companies with a view to passing the same on to American concerns. The object of course is that, having this information the government may cost the American company entirely to assist British insurance. "In the same vein is the clause which waives in favor of American insurance companies to the Sherman anti-trust law. This is entirely on a par with the methods adopted by the Shipping Board during the war when it transferred the confidential information given to the Shipping Board solely for the purpose of the war was being used to enable American shipping to defeat British shipping after the war. "We in this country now know that we are to be faced with the most bitter competition for the supremacy of the seas which we have ever had to meet. We are in for a big fight, not before America can win the right she now create a national feeling for a mercantile marine. ### HON. MR. MEIGHEN HAS NOW PAID UP

And His Name Has Been Removed from Defaulting Taxpayers' List.

(Ottawa, July 25.—Hon. Arthur Meighen, Prime Minister of Canada, has removed his name from the "Might Be Sued" list at City Hall by the simple expedient of paying his civic income tax amounting to \$146.75. Recently when the corporation declared war on the civil servants who held they were not legally liable for the 1920 civic income tax, Hon. Mr. Meighen's name was included on the list of those who had failed to pay. This list includes several ministers, deputy ministers, supreme court justices and other prominent civil servants.

### AT THEIR OLD TRICKS.

Christiana, July 25.—A blacklist of German firms who are alleged to have broken contracts with Norwegian merchants is being prepared by the Christiania Chamber of Commerce and will be published as a warning to Norwegian to "be careful of closing deals in Germany." The Christiania Chamber of Commerce now has under consideration names of 70 German firms against whom complaints have been made that they broke contracts, principally because of an unfavorable rate of exchange. It is understood German chambers of commerce are co-operating with the Norwegians to force the German firms to fulfill their contracts.
