STATISTICAL DATA—QUERY RESPECTING INTRODUCTION OF NEW BUDGET

Hon. Michael Wilson (Etobicoke Centre): Madam Speaker, I delayed putting my question because I had expected the Minister of Finance to be in the House. Possibly I can put my question to the Minister of Energy, who is rumoured to be the Minister of Finance shortly.

Mr. Smith: A lot sooner than you will be, Mike.

Mr. Wilson: The economic plan of the Minister of Finance is now in total shambles. That came out this morning in the briefing documents for the Versailles Summit which show that growth in the national income, anticipated to be 2.2 per cent, is now minus .5 per cent. The budget estimated unemployment at 7.8 per cent, it is now estimated at 9.2 per cent for the year and, as the minister knows, it is now in fact 9.6 per cent. That means there are now 200,000 more unemployed than were estimated at the time of the budget.

Since the minister's economic plan has proven to be totally out of touch with reality, and since so many of the members of cabinet and caucus are pushing the minister for a new economic plan and budget, would the Minister of Energy state whether it is the intention of the government to have a new economic plan and budget shortly following the Versailles Summit?

Hon. Pierre Bussières (Minister of State (Finance)): Madam Speaker, the figures referred to by the hon. member, which were published yesterday in a briefing document for the Versailles Summit, did not originate from the Department of Finance but were taken from a study prepared by the International Monetary Fund. Since the hon. member is accustomed to seeing various organizations prepare forecasts and publish figures, he should know the relative value of such statistics. I should like to remind the hon, member that the best way to bring down interest rates and unemployment is, as the Prime Minister indicated yesterday in his press conference, to restore a climate of confidence, and in order to do so, we must get rid of the uncertainty created by high levels of inflation. I would invite the hon. member to support the efforts being made by the present government to reduce the inflationary pressures and expectations which are causing this uncertainty.
