CATTLE MARKETS.

Cables About Steady—U. S. Markets Are Easier for Hogs.

London, April 13.—Live cattle are quoted at 11 1/2c to 12 1/2c; hogs at 9 1/2c to 10 1/2c; sheep at 9 1/2c to 10 1/2c.

TORONTO LIVE STOCK.

Receipts of live stock at the city market since Tuesday, as reported by the railways, were 105 car loads, consisting of 1701 cattle, 1468 hogs, 455 sheep and lambs, 220 calves and 1 horse.

Prices ranged from \$5 to \$3.75 per cwt. for steers, the bulk selling at \$5.25 to \$5.50 per cwt. export bulls at \$3.75 to \$4.50 and export cows at \$4 to \$4.50 per cwt.

Choice picked lots of Easter cattle, as good quality as any exporters on market sold at \$5 to \$5.25 per cwt., with one lot of 5 at \$5.50 per cwt. and 3 extra choice heifers, 1220 to 1200 lbs. each, at \$5.75 to \$6.00, with one 1240 lbs. at \$6.00 per cwt.; loads of good butchers' cattle at \$5.75 to \$6.00; medium cattle at \$4.25 to \$4.50; common at \$4 to \$4.25; cows at \$3.50 to \$4; inferior to rough at \$3 to \$3.25 and canners at \$2.50 to \$2.75 per cwt.

Short-keep feeders were higher in price, in sympathy with the fat cattle; steers of good quality, 1100 to 1200 lbs. each, sold at \$5 to \$5.25 per cwt.; feeders, 1000 to 1100 lbs. each, at \$4.50 to \$4.75; feeders, 800 to 900 lbs. each, at \$4 to \$4.25; stockers, 600 to 700 lbs. each, at \$3.50 to \$3.75; stock calves of good quality, 400 to 500 lbs. each, at \$3.50 to \$3.75 and inferior stock calves, 400 to 500 lbs. each, at \$2.75 to \$3 per cwt.

And 30 milch cows and springers sold at \$30 to \$55 each.
Deliveries of calves were liberal. Prices were about the same as on Tuesday, at \$2 to \$3 each, or \$3.50 to \$3.50 per cwt. for the bulk; choice calves are worth up to \$4.25 per cwt.

The run of sheep was a little larger and prices were unchanged from those quoted on Tuesday, as follows: export ewes sold at \$4.75 to \$5.50 per cwt.; bucks, \$3.75 to \$4.50; mixed lots, \$4.50 to \$5 per cwt.; choice yearling lambs, ewes and wethers, grain-fed, sold at \$7.25 to \$7.75 per cwt.; heavy back lambs sold at \$8 to \$8.50; medium back lambs sold at \$6.50 to \$7 per cwt. It will be seen that ewe and wether lambs are worth \$1.25 per cwt. more than bucks, which means from \$1 to \$1.25 per head more for wethers. Spring lambs sold at \$5 to \$6 each.

Receipts of hogs were fairly large, 1968. Mr. Harris quoted the prices unchanged, but firm, at \$6.25 for select and \$5 per cwt. for hogs and fats, all fed and watered.
