Found Dead in Bed.

Montreal, June 20.—E. C. Curry formerly one of the members of Trinity College School, Port Hope, was found dead in his bed yesterday at Bucks Avenue. Some years since Mr. Curry was transferred to the high school, Montreal, and has been teaching here ever since. His wife and child had been visiting in Port Hope and were only informed yesterday of the death.

FOUR SAILORS BURNED

In Destruction by Fire of Steamer "City of Collingwood."

A. T. R. Freight Sheds Also Destroyed—Other Members of the Crew Had a Narrow Escape For Their Lives—Lost Vessel Was Valued at \$125,000, But Insured for \$80,000—Grand Trunk's Loss Is \$20,000.

Collingwood, June 20.—A disastrous fire broke out on the steamer City of Collingwood at 1 o'clock yesterday morning, which burned the vessel to the water's edge, cost the lives of four of the crew, and wiped out the Grand Trunk freight sheds before it was subdued. Several other members of the crew had a narrow escape, and had to jump into the water to avoid the flames spread. Those who were burned to death were: James Meade, Presscott, Sreman; Lyman Peters, Owen Sound, deck hand; A. McLellan, East Toronto, Mich., deck hand, and one deck hand who has not yet been identified.

Capt. Wright, who had just left the boat a short time, was at his home. He made desperate attempts to save his crew, and succeeded in awakening J. D. Montgomery, the second mate, and the wheelman, but was unable to get the water to avoid the flames. Two members of the steward's department also saved their lives by taking to the water. Further efforts to save the doomed sailors were futile. The steamer was a mass of flames from stem to stern.

Flagship Was a Wooden Ship.—The City of Collingwood was the flagship of the Georgian Bay division of the Northern Navigation Co., and was valued at \$115,000. She was built by John Simpson in Owen Sound in 1893. She was a wooden vessel, 215 feet long and 34 feet wide, and was fully insured at Lloyd's.

There was little freight lost, as the Minnie M. and the Germania had made a delivery on Saturday, but the Grand Trunk freight sheds were wiped out and are a complete loss. They were valued at \$15,000. The captain is at a loss to account for the fire. The City of Collingwood arrived at 10:30 Sunday morning with the Britannia in tow, which she had released from Campbell's Rock. The ship attacked the Britannia, but was quickly cut out after she had been towed out by a tug.

The Grand Trunk's total loss is estimated at \$30,000. The sheds were completely burned with five cars. The steamer was insured in the British Lloyds for \$80,000. The total loss is \$125,000.

DIVER FROM CANOE; DROWNS.

Boy Unable to Reach Craft—Cousin Sees Him Sink.—Huntville, June 20.—On Sunday morning about 10 o'clock Victor Crompton, 14 years old, whilst bathing with a cousin in Waterhouse Lake, dived into the water from a canoe and when he came up he could not get out. His cousin was on the shore a short distance away, but had no means of helping him, and not being able to swim could give no assistance and went home and told the father. The body was found about 4 p.m.

Took Cramps.—Brantford, June 20.—Wm. Humble, aged 19 years, an Englishman, was drowned morning drowned in the wooden mill flume, while bathing. He took cramps.

The body of a man supposed to be Hiron Nelles of Brantford, who, it was supposed, was drowned, has been found in the Black River, New Ontario.

Drowned in Bay of Quinte.—Belleville, June 20.—A drowning accident occurred yesterday morning at 5 o'clock in the Bay of Quinte. A party of boys arose early and went down under and jumped off the docks, striking on his chest and stomach, taking away his breath. He came to the surface apparently in great agony but sank again. He was 22 years of age.

Drowned While Bathing.—Sandwich, June 20.—John Oxworth, 14 years of age, only son of a laborer here, was drowned in the old canal here Saturday night while bathing. The family formerly lived in Comber.

Ignored Warnings.—Galt, June 20.—Willie Hubert, aged 12, drowned in the Grand River last night while bathing. The boy did not know how to swim and despite the warnings of his uncle and a cousin, went in about 12 feet of water a short distance from the shore, and his body was not recovered for about three-quarters of an hour. The lad's father died about two weeks ago and the family was partly dependent upon the lad's earnings.

Ex-Mayer Drowns.—Ottawa, June 20.—General sorrow prevails in Ottawa at the tragic death of ex-Mayor Samuel Bingham, who was drowned in the Gattineau River, one mile south of Wakefield, Saturday afternoon. He fell asleep in his buggy and the horse walked into the river, going into a deep hole.

Killed Between Cars.—London, June 20.—Pietro Cusapoli, an Italian laborer, employed on the Grand Trunk double-tracking operations, was instantly killed near the Stratford depot yesterday morning. He was standing on the end of a flat car, which was being shunted when a sudden jerk threw him head foremost between the cars and across the tracks. The car and the front truck of the next car passed over him, mangle him terribly.

An Electrician Shocked.—Toronto, June 20.—Gilbert McDougall, assistant electrician of the Fire Department, had a close call yesterday morning. He had ascended a trolley pole. In some way he got a current from the trolley wire. Electrician Simpson, who was with him, was startled to see McDougall's legs being drawn up to his body and then to see him fall. He fell some 20 feet to the pavement, striking on his forehead and knees, and was taken to the Emergency Hospital with a bad gash over the left eye, his left arm sprained and many bruises.

One of Vigilant's Victims.—Amherstburg, June 20.—The body of a man was washed ashore in east side, Pelee Island, on Sunday. It was dressed in civilian coat and and rubber boots and is supposed to be that of one of the fishermen from the American tug Grace M., sunk while poaching near Pelee Island by the Dominion cruiser Vigilant.

Auto Takes Him Into the Canal.—Montreal, June 20.—Young William Redpath dashed with his automobile over the canal bank at Selgrouse street yesterday afternoon and formally opened the bathing season at that point. A plank thrown to his assistance proved to be a friend in need. He was hauled safely ashore.

BABE IN WOODS MURDER.—May Hope Young and Kingsley Melanson Arrested For the Crime.—Halifax, June 20.—The coroner's jury at Digby concluded the taking of evidence in the inquiry into the cause and manner of death of Mary Ward, at 6 o'clock last evening, and by a 9-0 verdict had been reached that the girl came to her death by suffocation at the hands of May Hope Young, and "while the evidence is strong against Kingsley Melanson, as being a party to the death, yet we do not feel justified in rendering a verdict against him as being a party to the crime. We do recommend that a thorough investigation be made by the proper authorities, to ascertain whether Melanson assisted in the crime in causing the death."

After the rendering of the verdict, Samuel J. Milberry, head marker of Plympton and a member of the coroner's jury, laid an information against both May Hope Young and Kingsley Melanson, charging them with the murder of the child and High Sheriff Smith took the parties to the jail in Digby. As Melanson was handcuffed, Mrs. Young held up her hands to the sheriff, remarking: "Put them on," but the suggestion was not acceded to.

What Autopsy Showed.—The autopsy shows no signs of food in the stomach of the dead child, going far to disprove the evidence of Mrs. Young, who claimed to have left the children at 5 o'clock. May evening, each with a piece of bread and cornmeal, the latter of which she claimed to have been eaten, the bread being found with a small piece bitten out.

The child weighed only 21 pounds 4 ounces, or but about half what a healthy 6-year-old should weigh. There was no evidence of the child having been the victim of wasting sickness, and the alternative would be insufficient food. The state of decomposition further indicated that Mary Ward must have been dead at least 36 hours when found, which would prove the impossibility of the two children having been alive at the time Mrs. Young says she left them playing in the yard.

When entering the jail last night the woman broke down and wept.

To Answer For Child Murder.—Toronto, June 20.—Emma Harvey, the young woman whose infant was found dead in her room at 30 Walton street a few weeks ago, will appear in the Police Court this morning to answer to the charge of child murder. She has been in the hospital. William Furness, who was arrested as an accomplice, may be in custody since the death of the baby.

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Say It Is Murder Now.—Hamilton, June 20.—The police now believe that Fred Fieldhouse, the young fellow found dying in the woodshed at the rear of 157 Princess street Saturday morning, was murdered in a drunken brawl. They have arrested James Neelon, 354 North Bay street; Mike Connors and Stanley Davis, 21 Tiffany street. The only charge that has been laid against the prisoners yet is disorderly conduct, but they were remanded by the police magistrate yesterday morning and had Tuesday evening. Fieldhouse's skull was battered in with a club.

SET ASIDE 240,000 ACRES.—Government Will Do That to Aid Farm Colonies in Canada.—London, June 20.—The report submitted by H. Rider Haggard, who, as commissioner of the Colonial Office, has recently been investigating the conditions and character of the farm colonies organized in the United States by the Salvation Army, last night was issued as a Parliamentary blue book.

The report speaks most favorably of the colonies and says that similar settlements might be successfully established in the British colonies to provide for the surplus agricultural population of the United Kingdom in different parts of the empire, especially in Canada, where the Government is prepared to set aside 240,000 acres for this purpose.

ROAD LIABLE TO A FINE.—Even if Men Are Safe Under Alien Labor Law.—Ottawa, June 20.—The Deputy Minister of Labor, W. L. M. King, states that while the decision of Justice Anglin in the deportation of aliens brought in under extra-territorial contracts he does not think the decision covers the provision in the act imposing a penalty for bringing in aliens under contract. That provision of the law declares it an offence punishable by a fine of \$50 to \$1,000 to bring in labor under contract.

In the opinion of Mr. King, the Bere Marquette is still liable to this fine, though the men it brought in cannot be deported.

Soldier Thieves Sentenced.—St. Catharines, June 20.—The two soldiers, Edward Wheeler and Samuel Kelly of the 44th (Welland) Regiment, who were accused of stealing at Niagara camp, had their trial here yesterday afternoon before Judge Carman. Kelly pleaded guilty to stealing shoes and other articles from comrades, and was given two weeks in jail. Wheeler was convicted of stealing \$50 from Capt. Coulson's tent, while the officer was asleep, and was sentenced to eleven months in the Central Prison.

Bishop Mills on Separate Schools.—Kingston, June 20.—At the opening of the Anglican Synod here yesterday Bishop Mills made a strong deliverance on the separate school question and on the part it played in the two political parties.

contract for the work on William St. if they will accept it.

Ald. Ainsworth called attention to the bill-boards on the city.

The Mayor referred him to the by-law in regard to same.

Ald. Potter called attention to the way in which the road had been dug up on Richmond St. and the trench not properly filled in. A milk wagon had got stuck in it.

The City Engineer said that the Gas Co. had been spoken to about this kind of work time and again.

The City Clerk said that the by-law covered this matter.

Works to look into.

Ald. Marshall presented the contract for the bitulithic pavement on Murray St., and moved that it be signed, with the condition attached that the pavement be not proceeded with until the sewer is laid on the rest of the street. Carried.

Ald. Marshall gave notice of motion of a by-law providing for the laying of a bitulithic pavement on Raleigh street.

Mayor Cowan called attention to the fact that water mains on the market square should be laid before the pavement.

Mayor Cowan brought up the matter of the transient traders by-law. Ald. Potter moved that the transient traders by-law be referred to the Finance committee to report what is wrong with it.

Ald. Marshall presented a petition for a vitrified brick pavement on William street from the C. P. R. to the creek. The petition was sufficiently signed and was referred to the City Engineer to report on.

Ald. O'Keefe moved that the initiative be taken and the Engineer's report be received on the Wellington street pavement.

The dog tax of W. E. Gundy and Mr. Newman were struck off.

The City Engineer's report on the brick pavement on William street was adopted.

Ald. O'Keefe moved that the cement walk on William street in

front of Mr. McGosh's residence be fixed. Carried.

Ald. Austin in reply to Ald. Westman said that the Industrial committee and the electric railway directors had both been busy with the electric road and neither party had had time to discuss the franchise. The Industrial committee wanted to know what the company was going to do before they were granted a franchise. He wanted definite information.

Ald. O'Keefe said that the capitalists who would put their money into the enterprise would be here to-morrow and he wanted to have something definite to lay before them.

Ald. Westman moved that a sub-committee be granted to the company subject to an agreement satisfactory to the Council. Ald. Ainsworth seconded the motion.

Ald. O'Keefe said that the Dominion Bank if they would take quarters in the new market building and they had said they would. He moved that the Council enter into an agreement with the Dominion Bank, renting the front of the market building to the Bank for five years.

He opposed renting Harrison Hall. Ald. Edmondson seconded the motion and approved of the proposal.

Ald. Potter strongly opposed the motion. He didn't think that the city should compete with the rate-payers in the city.

Ald. Westman pointed out that the revenue to be derived would be a material factor in reducing the cost of the market and of its maintenance.

Ald. Austin favored building the front on the market and renting the ground floor to the Dominion Bank.

Ald. King suggested laying the matter over for a few days.

Ald. O'Keefe thought that the city should erect such a building as could be used for a municipal building even if it were rented for the present to the Dominion Bank.

Ald. O'Keefe moved in amendment that the proposal be looked on with favor in the Council and that the Finance and Property committee be empowered to meet the officials of the Bank and open negotiations. The amendment carried.
