INTRODUCTORY

ICTORIA, at the southern extremity of Vancouver Island, a city basking in the favour of mountain, sea and climate, is rich in historic monuments.

Among these are the sister-buildings, St. Ann's

Academy and St. Joseph's Hospital, on Humboldt Street. Both institutions are conducted by the Sisters of St. Ann. The former was opened sixty years ago this June 5, 1918; the latter, eighteen years afterwards in 1876.

Tracing the origin of these Sisters of St. Ann; learning the motives which led them to cross from the peopled east of the Dominion to its unsettled west; taking part in their private and social round of duties; following their progress—such is the purpose to which this CHAPLET OF YEARS gladly lends itself in commemoration of the Sixtieth Anniversary of the arrival of St. Ann's Sisterhood in Victoria, B.C.
