B. C. BOARD OF TRADE.

The annual meeting of this representative commercial body was held in this city on Friday last, and resulted in the adoption of the annual report and the election of the following officers for the ensuing year: President, A. C. Flummerfelt; vice-president, C. E. Renouf; secretary, F. Elworthy. Council—Messrs. D. R. Ker, G. Leiser, W. H. Ellis, T. Fletcher, H. Bostock, A. B. Gray, H. E. Cannon, H. Croft. Arbitration committee—The council, with Messrs. W. Templeman, R. Erskine, H. F. Heisterman and F. C. Davidge.

The annual report was, as usual, a comprehensive one. It showed that though the volume of trade had not been as great as during the two previous years, it had been maintained in a healthy condition. It went on to say that "there is much capital locked up in unrealizable assets which, together with the more conservative policy of the banks, has lately caused money to circulate less freely. The temporary stringency has necessitated greater caution and stricter economy in all lines of business, and this will ultimately serve the best interests of the Province.
