The recommendation from His Majefty's Secretary of State, which Your Excellency has been pleafed to communicate to us, to encourage the railing of Hemp, shall meet our early and ferious attention ; fenfible that as there is abundance of Land in the Province adapted to its culture, which under proper management and fuitable encouragement might be rendered productive, we shall use our best endeavours to devise the most effectual means, confistent with the circumstances of the Province to promote its growth.

We shall be happy to receive from your Excellency every information that may aid our deliberations on this important subject.

Your Excellency's continued attention to the improvement of the Province, and the convenience and comfort of His Majesty's subjects, merits our warmest thanks : The benefits refulting from the liberal Grants made the last and preceding Sessions of Affembly -- for opening and repairing Roads and building of Bridges, are very generally felt, and have been of great public as well as private utility;-neverthelefs, we are fully fenfible that further aid is neceffary to complete more effectually those already commenced, and likewife to open others, fo as to render the valuable and yet unfettled districts of the country, accessible for the accommodation of the increasing inhabitants.

It is therefore highly gratifying to us to learn from your Excellency, that the ftrick regularity in fecuring and collecting the revenues, will enable us to comply with your Excellency's recommendation, without laying any additional burthens uponour constituents.

It shall be our study, as it undoubtedly is our interest and convenience, assiduously to expedite the affairs that come before us with harmony, being convinced the public good cannot be promoted efficacioully, without fuch adispolition and conduct.

Refolved, That the faid Address be presented to his Excellency by the whole House.

Ordered, That the Clerk do wait on his Excellency to know when he will be pleafed to be attended by this Houfe, and also receive the Committee of this House on the fubject of the Election for Sydney.

On Motion of Mr. Millidge, Ordered, that Mr. Millidge, Mr. Fulton, and Mr. Robie, be a Committee of Claims agreeable to the refolution of Tuefday laft.

The Clerk reported, that he had, pursuant to order, waited upon his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, to know when he would be pleafed to receive the Addrefs and the Committee of this House, and that his Excellency had been pleased to appoint to-morrow at twelve o'clock at the Government-House.

On Motion, Ordered, that Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Wallace, and Mr. Crane, be a Committee, to report what Laws are near expiring, and alto for preparing and bringing in a Bill for continuing the fame.

Mr. Treasurer Wallace pursuant to order presented to the House, an account of all Monies received by him into, and payments by him made from the Provincial Treasury, from the 1st January, 1800, to the 31st March, 1801, inclusive.

Ordered, That the faid Accounts do lie on the Table, to be perused by the Members of this House.

Mr. Millidge, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill, to incorporate the Subscribers to the Bank of Nova Scotia, and the fame was read a first time.

Resolved, That the Bill be read a second time.

A Meffage from the Council informing the House, that they had appointed a Com. mittee for examining the Public Accounts; and that they would be ready to meet the Committee of this Hosfe in the Council Chamber, to-morrow at Eleven of the Clock. Ordered
