Tenders for electric supplies for Q. M. school were referred to the Printing and Supplies. The board decided not to let the contract bond on Queen Mary school until the completion of the building.

Q. M. S. ENTRANCE

The arrangement of the Queen Mary School grounds on Isabelle St. was discussed. Mr. O'Flynn submitted a plan after Mr. Mallory had announced a proposition. The Isabelle street entrance is steep. Mr. O'Flynn suggested a walk, walls at the front, a large central garden plot and a traffic entrance at the center on Isabelle street for pupils, vehicles and motor cars.

Mr. O'Flynn said the front had to be finished anyway. The foundation of the school should be taken down some. The bank should be cut down 18 inches. This excavation will do the filling in. The wall would not be a large expense. This will give a beautiful entrance. The expense might be all put on today. The walks could be laid in conformity with a plan to be carried out in future.

Col. Ponton said this plan was the best possible that could be imagined on the score of utility and economy. Let us lay our walks so as not to prevent the completion of this plan. The opportunity is there and the board should take advantage of it.
