Mrs. GEORGE MOORE. St. Andrews lost one of its oldest residents in the death of Mrs. Moore, widow of the late George Moore, who passed away at her home on Tuesday, June 30, 1915.

Mrs. Moore lived in St. Andrews until eighteen years ago, when her family moved to Sydney. She returned here two years ago to reside with her daughter, Mrs. L. C. Estes.

The deceased was eighty-eight years of age at the time of her death, and leaves nine children; six daughters, Mrs. Williamson, Rena, Victoria, Co., Mrs. Robertson, Barbara, N. S., L. C. Estes, St. Andrews; Mrs. T. E. Gibson and Mrs. H. Jordan, West Somerville, Mass.; and Mrs. H. Patterson, East Everet, Mass.; and three sons, Samuel and George, of Eastport, Me., and Arthur, of Boston, Mass.

MURRAY BYRON. Seldom, if ever, has Campobello been the scene of so large and so sorrowful funeral assemblage as that which gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George M. Byron on Thursday afternoon to pay the last sad respects to their son, the late Murray Byron.

Extensive notices of his accidental death by drowning while canoeing with college friends at Elbow Lake, N. S., have appeared in the press. The sorrowing parents were deluged with tender messages of sympathy from loving friends all over the Maritime Provinces and the United States as well; but it remained for the many life-long associates and friends of his home village to pay the last full measure of grief over his remains.

From early boyhood he was making of his splendid talents, first a successful school teacher, then a brilliant Divinity student at Kings' College, and lastly putting on the King's uniform and offering his services to the country in Town last week.

The casket was followed with beautiful flowers. So many of his friends here and elsewhere sent floral emblems that space does not permit mention of all their names, but among the many were wreaths from the Faculty at King's College, W. A. of the Church of England, college friends in Nova Scotia, and the Eastport Lodge of Elks, of which Order his father was a member.

In the absence of Bishop Richardson, who found it impossible to attend, the funeral services were conducted by the Ven. Rev. Arch-Deacon Newham, of St. Stephen, Rev. Mr. Tomlin, of St. Stephen, and the Rev. Rector, Rev. Mr. John T. The Sermon by the Arch-Deacon was touching, sympathetic and inspiring. From an intimate acquaintance with the deceased he could speak from his own knowledge of his fine many disposition and genuine christian character.

The loving hands of his boyhood friends placed his coffin in the grave while the granite rain was falling over the garden. The words of the psalmist were applicable to each life some rain must fall, some day must be dark and dreary. Yes! to the grief-stricken hearts that are grieved, dark and dreary. But they mourned not as those without hope, for they have the comfort of knowing that they are grieved by a truly manly man, and also the divine assurance that the redeemed of the Lord will be reunited in God's Heavenly Kingdom.

SIR ROBERT BORDEN IN ENGLAND.

Sir Robert Borden, looking very well after his trip across the Atlantic, arrived in London July 9, accompanied by R. B. Bennett, M. P. for Calgary; A. C. Boyce, M. P. for West Algona, and his secretary, Loring Christie.

Seen at the Savoy Hotel soon after his arrival, he informed the Montreal Gazette correspondent that the trip had been comfortable and undisturbed by alarms.

Cable dispatches dated June 27, announcing his departure from Canada, were only released by the censor for publication in England after the ship arrived at Liverpool Thursday night, July 8.

The Evening Standard, London, on July 9, in an editorial headed "The Imperial Idea," said:

"It is a matter of great satisfaction to learn that the Premier of the Dominion of Canada has arrived, and to have visible assurance of the active co-operation of the Empire's statesmen. Sir Robert Borden will not receive or accept the tumultuous greeting that would be his in ordinary times, but he is an honored and most welcome guest. From the point of view of the relations between the British Empire and foreign states, nothing can exceed the significance of a whole-hearted participation in the struggle."
