CASCADE AND BONANZA.

REPUBLIC MILL A SUCCESS.

Major Leckie Says It Saves 93 Per Cent of the Assay Value.

Major R. G. Edwards Leckie, manager of the Republic mine and mill, was in the city yesterday.

ANOTHER TRIUMPH.

Chris Foley Fills the Auditorium at Greenwood.

Greenwood, Nov. 26.—(Special.)—Christopher Foley, labor candidate for parliamentary honors at the coming election, was tendered a magnificent reception, to-night at the Auditorium.

His convincing arguments, interspersed with witty stories, held the audience in close rapt attention.

The keynote of his address was the Mongolian question and public ownership of public utilities.

He said the old parties were hidebound in their principles, and though Laurier himself was progressive, no reforms would be accomplished for the benefit of the working classes until they themselves elected their own representatives in parliament.

What the Liberal party had accomplished in their behalf was only a bait to catch votes.

Mechanical ingenuity during the past 40 years had no revolutionizing things that it had resulted in the accumulations of vast fortunes for a few, and instead of bettering conditions wealthy corporations were introducing cheap labor to de throne Canadian citizenship.

This was not helping to develop the natural resources of the country, and instead of Canada going forward, as it should, employing well-paid labor, like Germany, England, and the United States, it would become unprogressive like China, Turkey and the greater portion of Russia, where cheap labor is employed, if laws were not enacted and enforced the restriction of pauper immigration from Europe and the hordes that were coming over from Japan and China.

He appealed to the merchants to use their influence to prevent this state of things, as it would ultimately ruin their business as it was ruining the wages of workingmen.

He argued that the days of accomplish reform by strikes, boycotts and lock-outs were over, as capital had only to touch the button and open floodgates of misery by introducing alien paupers.

"Are you going to follow the old style, or are you going to enter the political arena and get justice?" he asked. Old methods did not strike at the root of the disease, and a start must be made, and through getting into politics would it be accomplished.

He touched on what the two old parties had done for working classes, and pointed out that it was little indeed when compared with what had been done for the rich and the big corporations.

He bitterly denounced Conservatives for bringing into this province at the time of the construction of the Canadian Pacific over eight thousand Chinese, under the promise to deport them when the road was completed, but instead turning them loose to drive out white labor employed in sawmills, canneries and fishing industries on the coast.

Even now this horde was marching to the interior, and in time would cross the Rockies, there to meet the Doukhobors and Slavonic emigrants, who were being poured into Canada from older worlds.

Between those two tidal waves of cheap labor the white man would be crushed. This he claimed, would only be prevented by wise legislation, and to obtain it workingmen must be represented in parliament.

In southern language he denounced the senate, which he described as a home for old political mossbacks, who were obstructions to legislation passed in the interest of the laboring classes.

He concluded with a brief recital of the platform of the Labor Party, and promised that if elected he would use his best offices to prevent the landing in this country of pauper immigration; put a stop to railroad monopolies, and work in the interests of government ownership of public utilities.

Foley was followed by an interesting speech from James Wilkes, which terminated the meeting.

Faith-Healers Charged With Murder.

Victoria, Nov. 27.—Eugene Brooks, leader of the faith-healers, and W. W. Mathey, father of the child who died from diptheria under their ministrations, have been arrested for murder as a result of the verdict of the coroner's inquest.
