CITY COUNCIL IS ENDORSED

**Street Railway Deal Looks Good to Trades and Labor Men.**

A short but interesting meeting of the Trades and Labor Council was held last night in their labor temple.

It transpired during the debate on the report of the two delegates representing the council on the recent railway committee, that the Trades and Labor Council were fully agreed on the wisdom of the resolution taken by the city and the committee, and the city council can rest assured that the T. and L. Council will be one of the ones to stand back of them when the time comes to vote for the by-law, as it was felt that if the by-law carries, the acquiring of the railway by the city will mean a great deal to those who now have so far to go to their work, in that the proposed extensions will be of immense benefit.

The report of the committee was presented by Delegates Symonds and Scott in a very able manner, and the thanks of the council were tendered them for their able co-operation in the matter. Reference was also made by the committee to the very kind and courteous manner in which the delegates of the T. and L. had been received.

The attention of the council was called to the fact that there is still some bad leakage of the gas mains, particular mention being made of one being near Greenway street, and close to the railway crossing.

The question of the extension and also the closing in of that part of the market where the meat is sold before the warm weather is upon us was brought up and touched upon. It was felt that the city council should attend to this and thus prevent the produce from becoming covered with disease-laden dust germs. It was felt that it would be well to take up these matters again at some future meeting.

Communications were received from Mayor Spence, explaining the floor space charge of the Hydro Electric Commission, and from A. K. Bunnell to the effect that the school board would take up the Trades and Labor Council's resolution to free text books in the public schools.

**Obituary**

**Mrs. Dealtry.**  
Mrs. Margaret C. Dealtry died in Buffalo yesterday aged 56 years. The remains will be brought to Brantford for burial to-morrow, by the G. T. R. The deceased was the widow of Fred Dealtry, who was formerly of this city, and the remains will be laid to rest beside those of her late husband, who lies buried at Greenwood cemetery. The funeral will take place to-morrow from the G. T. R. station.

**John B. Fallis.**  
A venerable and greatly respected citizen of Brantford passed away this morning when John B. Fallis, yielded to the last call. The deceased, who was born at Milton eighty years ago, came to the city twenty-four years ago and has resided here ever since. He was one of the pillars of the Wellington St. Methodist Church from whose congregation he was created a member in Brantford, where they will join hands with numerous friends in Milton in consoling with the bereaved family. Left to mourn the sad loss are, Mrs. Fallis, four daughters and one son. The funeral will take place on Saturday to Mount Hope from the late residence, 29 West Street. Every sympathy is extended to the mourners.

**HE ASSESSED THEM**

Detective W. Fraser of the Grand Trunk detective force is in the city, investigating the case of the two Hungarian women and two children who were found in a box car at St. Thomas, after having stolen a ride from Niagara Falls, N.Y. The cries of the children, who were suffering from the cold, having been heard around St. Thomas yard for about 12 hours, attracted the attention of one of the brakemen, who upon opening the door found the occupants huddled in one corner of the car, nearly perished with cold and hunger.

In company with Mr. Louis Stander, he paid a visit to the home of the women and after talking with them a while decided that he would let the immigration officers take action against them for stealing their way across from the American City. All he did was to assess them \$3.25 each railroad fare for the Grand Trunk.

Detective Fraser left at 1.42 for Niagara Falls where he will report the case to the immigration authorities.

**MANIAC FOUND FROZEN STIFF**

TORONTO, Feb. 19.—The body of Bart Newmans, a maniac, who disappeared from Mimico, some six miles from Toronto, was found this morning half a mile west of the Credit River, frozen to death. Newmans had divested himself of all of his clothing, folded them neatly and lain down on top of them. When found he was frozen stiff.

**FINED \$100 FOR SELLING BOOZE**

**Foreigner in the Police Court To-day Found Guilty**

B. Bozoiian, an Austrian, was charged at the police court this morning with a breach of the liquor license act. He pleaded not guilty. Mr. Eacrett, license inspector, said he entered defendant's premises at 157 Darling street and found there a case of lager. This he seized as he had no belief that Bozoiian was selling liquor. Defendant admitted that the liquor was his but he said he did not sell it. Witnesses were missing and the case was remanded until to-morrow.

Another case of illicit private liquor dealing came up when Maroos Zimjanaviz was charged with a breach of the license law. He is an Armenian and lived next door to some defendants of yesterday, who lived at 155 Darling street. They said they had obtained their liquor from him. He said being a neighbor of theirs on the same street made them friends. He had not sold them any liquor. He had just given them a bottle to oblige them and was given ten cents for his kindness. P. C. Tyrrell gave evidence and said he found a disorderedly and liquor was flowing freely. In this he was corroborated by P. C. Stewart. Telling defendant that he could not oblige friends in this manner, the magistrate fined him \$100 and costs or three months. He will probably take the time. "It is an easy way of making a living," said the Magistrate, "and it must be stopped."

Thomas Bonny, a billed man journeyed to Paris and obtained some drink there and the fact was subsequently discovered and it cost defendant \$20 and costs. He was told that by his action he made the bartender liable to a fine of \$50.

Two foreign assault cases were up on the list and one of them will not come up until to-morrow. The other in which Mike Coveic and Jos. Kamplin were charged with assaulting Mike Morris was dismissed as Magistrate Livingston said the charge had fallen through.

Morris was informed that the had just escaped a \$100 fine through mere technicality. He had sold liquor without a license and information was laid against him just a few hours over the thirty days' limit which would have made his offence punishable.

**CALEDONIA AND SMALLPOX OUTBREAK.**

CALEDONIA, Ont., Feb. 13.—The report sent out from Hamilton that the schools, churches and moving picture theatres here were closed because of a big smallpox outbreak, is exaggerated. Whilst it is true that places where the public assemble, have been closed, this was merely done as an extraordinary measure of precaution. There are four cases under suspicion, but doctors have been unable to say definitely that any of the patients are smallpox victims.

**Hockey Abroad**

**Mr. Hugh Livingston Tells of International Play On Ice**

Mr. Hugh Livingston, who recently returned from Paris, France, left the city this morning for North Bay, where some \$100,000 worth of work awaits him, on his farm.

Whilst Mr. Livingston was studying in the French capital, he met a Toronto friend, Mr. Howard Webster, who was asked soon after meeting his old Brantford chum to join the Prince's English hockey team, then playing in Switzerland, and it is remarkable that Webster and J. Clarkson, another Torontonian, scored 12 of the 48 goals which the British hockey team scored against the picked men of various countries.

Through the great assistance of the two Canadians, Britain carried off the International honors and beat all opposition. Howard Webster afterwards said that the hardest team to defeat were the Germans of Berlin. The fact that the Canadians scored seven-eighths of Britain's total score shows of what invaluable aid they gave to the team. Incidentally Dr. Charles Hartley, a former Brantford boy, is one of the stars of the Kaiser's septette in Berlin.

**TALE OF FINANCE HARD TO UNFOLD**

How a civic employee, sort of a sub-foreman among foreign employees, as it were, accumulated a fortune of \$1,000 wherewith he is said to be returning to his native Hungary in four years time, working for the wage of 27 cents per hour, is a little problem in finance some of the civic authorities are trying to solve to-day. And yet it is stated that one man who is returning to-day to Hungary with 11 others has \$1,000 put away, and the entire party are the owners of ready cash to the extent of \$35,000 as reported in yesterday's issue.

The possessor of the \$1,000 was let work four years for the city. His minimum wage was about \$65 per month. Following the board of works investigation last summer, there was a demand for the man's dismissal. He was dismissed, but taken back on again, at kind of excuses being offered for his return. Ald. Sutcliffe, present Mayor and others got wind of his return, and an immediate demand was again made for the man's dismissal. The second time he was let out for good.

At the board of works enquiry, it was charged that there was sort of a system of paying tribute for jobs on city work.

**GERMAN ENGINES FOR GREAT BRITAIN**

**Big Contract is Let by the Southeastern Railway.**

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—A London cable to the Tribune says: The Southeastern Railway has placed a contract for ten powerful locomotives with a German firm at Tegel near Berlin. The placing of this contract is of more than ordinary importance, for although some years ago the Great Central, the Great Northern and the Midland companies introduced a number of freight locomotives which had been built in America, and the Great Western has introduced French locomotives into its Paddington and Plymouth express service, no German built locomotives have ever been imported into Great Britain with the exception of some small narrow gauge engines for contracting purposes. Certainly none have ever been used for main line service on any British railway system.
