BIG WIRE ROPE MILL GONE BY FIRE ROUTE

Over Half-Million-Dollar Blaze at Trenton, N.J.—Origin Unknown.

BIG WIRE Rope

Trenton, N. J., Nov. 1.—The big wire rope mill of the John A. Roebbling Sons Company and a number of nearby dwelling houses, were destroyed by fire, which started about 1 o'clock this morning and was still burning, although under control four hours later. For a time the six storey wire mill, which recently had been overhauled and new machinery installed to manufacture gun barrels for the Midvale Steel and Ordnance Company, which it was said, was being shipped to the European belligerents, was seriously threatened. Its roof caught fire several times but upon each occasion, the firemen succeeded in extinguishing the flames. An official statement as to the damage wrought by the fire was obtainable, but rough estimates placed it at about a half a million dollars. The burned rope mill was a new structure and all its machinery and equipment also were new. The origin of the fire, which started in the rope mill, had not been determined at an early hour to-day.

If it had succeeded, the effect on the war would have been decisive, and it was worth the risk.

TURKS PLACED UNDER ARREST

Had Copies of Prohibited and Violently Anti-British Paper.

Toronto, Nov. 11.—Back of the arrest of four Turks yesterday on a charge of having prohibited publications in their possession, the police believe is something more far-reaching—a plan to have Turks resident in Canada convert their assets into currency for the purpose of forwarding it to Turkey to aid that country in its fight against Great Britain and her allies. The men under arrest are—John Shibley, 536 Yonge street, Geo. Hacken, 202 Queen Street east, Ameen Batri, 1471 Yonge street, and Alexander Seycourt, 2006 Dundas St.

At the time of their arrest late issues of the "Al-Bayan" were found in their possession when searched by the police. It was said that an investigation showed that the copies of the prohibited publication were smuggled into Canada in bundles of other papers.
