COAL FAMINE THREATENS THREE CENTS A POUND NEW YORK FOR NEWS PRINT

New York, October 16—A shortage of coal is in prospect for this city this winter, according to dealers, who declare their bins are being depleted, and their outlook for immediate or eventual relief is poor. The shortage applies to both hard and soft coal.

Failure to receive the usual amount of coal is attributed to a scarcity of labor at the mines and lack of cars for transportation, the latter is said to be the most serious, due to the movement of arm munitions and other freight for export. The enormous foreign trade is also blamed for the shortage which, if as stated, exists in other sections of the country as well as here. Prices to New York householders for stove and nut coal vary from \$7 to \$7.75. Dealers declare that, with seasonable weather, the price will reach \$8 before Thanksgiving, and that \$9 coal is not too high to expect at Christmas. A cold winter will send prices higher.

Ottawa, October 17—In a conference of newspaper publishers and news print paper manufacturers held here today the manufacturers adhered to the price of three cents a pound that was quoted as a minimum in the conference last week before the ministry of finance.

The publishers conceded that some increase might be necessary but took the position that the proposed minimum price of three cents a pound was prohibitive.

As the publishers and the paper manufacturers were unable to reach an agreement, the request of the former for an investigation by the government stands, and it is likely an inquiry will be made by the department of finance.

The above price is wholesale price. The ordinary newspaper pays nearly double the above price adding freight from mill. —Ed.
