OUR GREAT NORTHWEST.

Mev. John McDougall's Unique Sermon Would Mean-A Little Figuring.

An exceedingly inspiring missionary sermon was heard by the members of the Metropolitan Methodist Church recently from Rev. John McDougall, Superintendent of the Methodist In-dian Missions in Manitoba and the Northwest. It was a unique sermon, and at the outset seemed more like an address by a western statesman to, say, the Board of Trade than a pulpit discourse. Mr. McDougali figures came as if from a politician, but were in reality the result close reasoning by a zealous mission ary. He spoke from an experience 42 years in travel and work through out every part of the Northwest, ar fessed that he knew only part of it, notwithstanding the fact that the pastor had introduced him as a man knowing more, perhaps about it than any other living per

Mr. McDougall took as an illustra tion of the greatness of that co near block of land 1,000 hals square (640,000,000 acres), abutting the 9th parallel, and lying between the Rockies and the western bounda.; Ontario. This great stretch of erritory contained, in his estimatrin, more acres capable of agriculture and of responding to the thrift and mechanical operation of industrious men than any other stretch of dimensions on the face of the globe. He called it the very a me of God's work in this respect. Of this great block of land he trok 100,000,000 acres, less than one-sixth of it, and placed a conservative estimate of a yield, when cultivated, of fifteen bushels an acre. Then he took the bulk estimate, and asked what it would mean to move it to the markets of the world. Looking at it as Mr. McDougall presented it, the haulage necessary seems enormous. He took a train of 40 cars leaving Winnipeg for the east. Each car would carry 1,000 bushels, making an aggregate cargo of 40,000 bushels. Then he asked how many bushels. Then he asked how many trains of that kind it would take to move his conservative estimate of fifteen bushels an acre of one-sixth of his selected block. He had found that it would take 37,500 trains of 40 cars, or a little more than 102 trains a day for every day of the ear. Figuring more finely still, he vear. mich trains moving out of Winnipeg every fifteen minutes, day and night, for 365 days to move the wheat

of country.

But Mr. McDougall did not confine his estimates to wheat alone. supposed that in time live stock would be raised in that part of the country. He had waited 23 years for a railway, and had come to know the virtue of patience. The country was rich in pasture land and grasses sof rich butter and cheese producing qualities, so that it promised great possibilities. Mr. Mc-Dougail allowed one fat bullock a year for shipping purposes to every 40 acres of one-sixth of the block moving out of Winnipeg every day for a year. To every ten acres he allowed one fat sheep and one mar-That meant 64,000,-000 of each, which, loaded 200 to a car, would show 32,000 trains of twenty cars each moving out of Winipeg, one about every fifteen min-ites, day and night, for a year.
