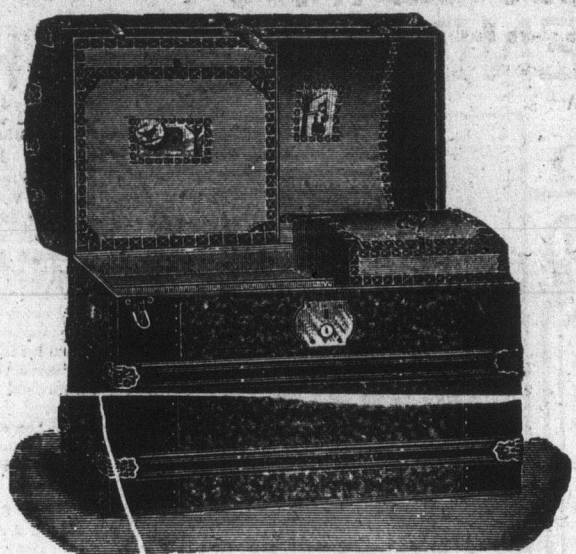

REBUKE MR GRAHAM

Toronto, April 6.—The first note of dissatisfaction among Liberals in the Legislature with the leadership of the Hon. G. P. Graham developed at a caucus of the party members this afternoon.

It appears that, when Mr. Graham the other day took upon himself to approve the increase in salaries of Cabinet Ministers suggested by the Hon. J. P. Whitney, Prime Minister, he spoke without having first consulted his following.

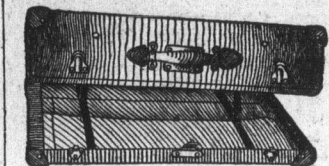

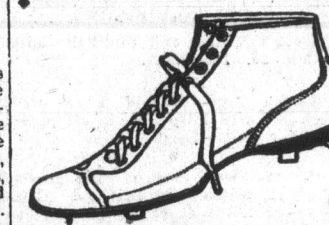

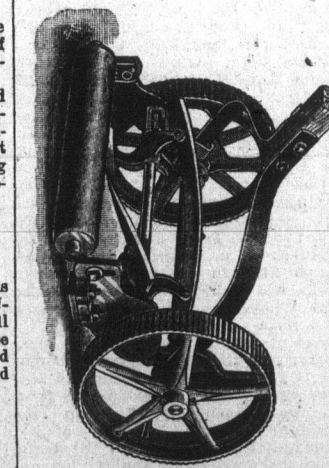
