Dramatic Scene at Korean Emperor's Palace.

His Majesty Abdicates With Suppressed Sigh-Elders Upheld Ministers -Council Agreed as to Necessity For Their Ruler's Retirement-Serious Disorders in Seoul-Crowd of 5,000 Gather In Streets.

Seoul, Korea, July 20.—It is reported that a most dramatic scene occurred at the palace Thursday night, when the ministers, headed by Premier Wang Yong, appeared before

red at the palace Thursday night, when the ministers, headed by Premier Wang Yong, appeared before His Majesty and made the Cabinet's final representation in urging the Emperor's abdication.

His Majesty was in a high state of excitement, but the Premier, in the must humble but firm tone dwelt at length upon want of precantion and prudence of the Emperor's policies hitherto, especially in diplomatic affairs, whereby he was endangering the safety of the nation. The Premier enumerated the facts of His Majesty's duplicities, which culminated in the despatch of a deputation to The Hague peace conference, and forcibly reasoned the uselessness of the Emperor's disavowal of his relation with The Hague affair.

Unable to successfully combat the logic of the Premier's representation, the Emperor sought a last refuge in the council of older statesmen, doubtless anticipating their sympathies.

The council immediately convened.
Four elders quickly responded and
appeared before His Majesty at one
o'clock yesterday morning.
The Emperor's 'disappointment and
surprise was boundless when they
unanimously agreed with the Minister's advice. His Majesty's mind was
finally made up, and he consented
to the draft for an imperial rescript
announcing his abdication, which was
placed before him for his signature.
The Emperor's condition was indescribable. Greatly agitated and perturbed, he signed the document and
the seal was affixed amid an impressive silence. A suppressed sigh from
the Emperor was the only sound
which broke the death-like stillness
that reigned throughout the memorable scene.

Briefly, the Emperor, in the imperial rescript of abdication, expressed his regret that during the 44 years of his reign, national calamities have followed in rapid succession and the people's distress has become so aggravated that he esteemed it now time to transfer the crown to the heirapparent in conformity with ancestral usages.

Last night serious disorders occurred. A crowd of 5,000 Koreans had been beaten back from the palace gates. During the audience with the Cabinet, when the Emperor acquiesced to the demand for abdication, a number of students attempted to present a petition to the Emperor, but the police prevented them from doing so, driving them back east of the palace, where they remained all night, making speeches. At midnight Chief of Police Maruyama distributed carbines to the police, the crowd continued to increase but remained orderly.

Some shops were closed because of the sympathy of their proprietors with the Emperor, and the streets around the palace were filled with people. The Japanese papers have published some sensational rumors, but there is little indication of a revolt

EXPLOSION ON YACHT

Gasoline Tank Burst-Kills One, Injures Three

Terrible Accident On the Bay At Toronto-Woman Burned to Death In Cabin-Engineer's Arm Broken In Three Places-Boat Sank In Several Feet of Water-Crew Had Narrow Escape.

Toronto, July 20.—Death and severe injury accompanied by a considerable property loss were caused by a gasoline explosion on Amelius Jarvis' big auxiliary yacht the Sitarah in the Yonge street slip yesterday at noon. Mrs. Valberg Backenstein, was burned to death, and Mrs. Christina Johnston lies in St. Michael's Hospital in a critical condition, being frightfully burned; while Nels Olsen, engineer of the ill-fated boat; Alf. Johnson, 15 years, cabin boy, and Ernest Johnson, 7 years, sons of Mrs. Johnson, are in the hospital suffering from lesser injuries.

The women, whose husbands work upon other yachts of the R.C.Y.C. fleet of which the Sitarah, a barge ketch, was the queen, had asked and secured permission to cross to the island in the boat, and First Mate Jack Jorgenson had given the signal for the boat to start when a deafening explosion took place.

Terrific Force.

So great was the force of this that the cabin top was lifted from its fastenings and one of the tenders was blown from the davits to the dock. Immediately there was a rush for the dock as flames leaped from the lower portion of the vessel.

Jorgenson, who was at the wheel on deck, reached the shore in safety, and Nels Olsen, who was standing by the engines, made his way on deck with his collarbone broken and his clothing alight. Charles Backenstein, a deckhand, who was on the deck, also jumped ashore.

At this point one of the Johnson boys was discovered on deck, and Patrick Rawlings, a young bystander, leaped upon the burning craft and seizing the lad in his arms made his way to the dock in safety amid the cheers of the onlookers.

Dived For Boy.

Frederick L. Faulkner, saw the other lad in the water, and instantly dived. He brought him to the dock after a struggle.

Mrs. Johnson appeared in the companionway. Her clothing was ablaze. She gained the deck and ran screaming to the dock, where her clothing was extinguished. Falls Into Flames.
When Mrs. Backenstein came from the cabin several stepped forward to help her, but just as the hands of the rescuers were upon her she threw up her hands and fell back into the flames.

Meanwhile the Bay street and Lom Meanwhile the Bay street and Lombard street divisions of the fire department and the fire tug Nelly Bly appeared upon the scene. Stretching hose from the Esplanade the firemen soon had two lines playing on the blazing boat, while an equal number played upon her from the fire tug, which had steamed alongside.

The Bay street chemical engine was brought into play and seemed to be the only thing which had any effect upon the burning gasoline, which was now escaping in large quantities from

now escaping in large quantities from the 55-gallon tank within the boat.

Feared Second Explosion.

This tank was the great fear in fighting the flames. It had not ex-ploded, and no one could say at what moment it might ignite, causing a still more serious explosion than the first.

When word of this danger spread among the crowds upon the dock, the police had little trouble in keeping the idly curious at a safe distance.

Nevertheless, the firemen worked on determinedly, and at last the supply of the chemical engine was exhausted, and it was sent away to be recharged, which took half an hour.

Vessel Scuttled.

At last it became apparent that to extinguish the flames the vessel must be sunk, and at the word of Mr. Jarvis, large streams were turned into the boat and at 1 o'clock she grounded in the slip, where she now lies.

Mrs. Backenstein's body was horribly burned, and even the firemen were sickened. All the clothing except a garter, and a gold chain, and the ears, nose, fingers and toes were burned away.

When the yacht began to sink half a dozen of the firemen had to make a hurried scramble for the dock.

Mr. Jarvis valued the boat at \$18,000. She was purchased at Detroit in 1905 from Russell Alger, Jr., since which time she has been fitted with her auxiliary engine. She was insured with the Federal Lloyds Company for \$5,000, which will nearly cover the loss on her.
