KEEPING YOUNG.

It is a Difficult Task if One Follows Fashionable Society.

How to keep young is one of the questions of perennial interest to the feminine mind. Amelie Rives, the noted author, who is said to look like a girl in her teens, recently told of her reply to a physician who wrote her to send him the secret of what he called her perpetual youth, says the Advance, "I wrote back that he must consider the cost," she said. "It is a cost that few of his fashionable patients would make, for I rise at 7 or 7:30, ride or walk in the country roads, live close to my books, see few people and retire at 10. What fashionable women could endure my life? I remember thinking about it one winter morning, when I was walking alone, the crisp, crackling snow under my feet, the fairy outline of a gossamer tree revealing every twig of bush and tree, and I was so invigorated and happy I could have whistled like a boy with delight. But if I had been a woman of fashion I couldn't have endured the silence, the empty distances, the quiet; why, a woman of fashion would die in my place, and I am quite sure that I should in hers." It is in such solitude and close communion with nature, in the home of her childhood—an old fashioned, rambling country home in Albemarle county, Va., that much of Amelie Rives' work is done.

THE TRAINED NURSE.

Why She Does Not Remain Long in Her Profession.

Carefully gathered statistics appear to show that the "merryest" of all women are trained nurses. Though complete figures have not as yet been compiled, from the considerable mass of data the conclusion is drawn that nine out of ten trained nurses marry during the first seven years of their occupation as such.

When a pretty young woman speaks of devoting her life to the self denying profession of a trained nurse she is using, perhaps unconsciously, a mere figure of speech. Statistics show that she has an even chance to be married within four and a half years and that she has one chance in eight of becoming the wife of a physician. The chances are five to one that within ten years she will marry one of her patients.

The importance of these figures from the viewpoint of the sociologist is obviously great. Pretty young women in steadily increasing numbers are entering the field in question, in which there seems always to be plenty of room for fresh recruits, who are required to fill the places of those who get married and pass out of the profession forever. Thus, owing to the causes suggested, it is rare indeed to discover a trained nurse who has been in the business for as much as ten years.—Saturday Evening Post.

CULINARY CONCEITS.
