At the close of the morning service at
the first Baptist church, on Sunday, the

touching letter, resigning the pastorate,
to take effect with the close of May. The
communication was a sad surprise to the
congregation, and there were few dry
eyes in the church at its conclusion. Dur-
ing his three and a quarter years here,
Mr. Wallace has been remarkably suc-
cessful; the spiritual condition of the church
has not been of such tone for a quarter
of a century; there have recently been
large accessions to membership, the audi-
ence both on Sundays and at the evening
meetings have more than doubled, and in
every respect and degree was there an un-
usual prosperity. Last summer Mr. Wal-
lace had a severe illness, depriving him
for months from his work, and from this
he has not yet fully recovered, and his
medical advisers have impressed upon
him the necessity of seeking a more con-
genial climate. His church are devotedly
attached to him, and by unanimous vote
at the recent society meeting three hun-
dred dollars were voted to secure good
accommodations for him, and to enable
him to remain upon his resignation, it
will prove an irreparable loss to the
church and society, who have not expec-
ted so marked prosperity during the
past quarter of a century as at the present
time, and there will be extreme re-
luctance to allowing him, even under
the pressure of necessity, to go
