An Open Air Service.

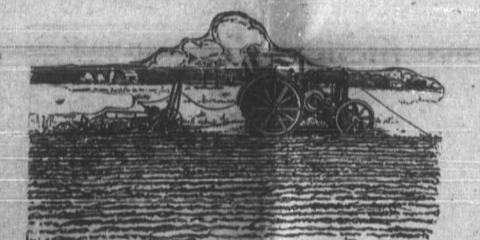

News Notes.

Dr. H. T. DeWolfe occupied the pulpit of the Windsor Baptist church on Sunday last.

On July 12 there were still 30,000 Canadian soldiers in England waiting to be sent home.

The British dirigible R.34 made the return trip from the United States to the British Isles in 75 hours.

Bear River reports prospects of a bounteous cherry crop. A cherry carnival will be held on the 24th.

Another vacancy has been made in the Cabinet by the resignation of Sir Thomas White, Minister of Finance.

The troopship Royal George with 500 Canadian soldiers on board is expected to arrive at Halifax on or about the 24th.

A Zepplin freight service to start about October 1, between New York and Hamburg, with Boston, Chicago Berlin and Düsseldorf as ports of call, was announced in New York on Tuesday.

After two years of war service in English and French waters the steamer Prince Arthur and Prince George returned back to Boston last week. They were used as hospital ships and transporters between Southampton and Havre.

Notice from Washington has been received that all travellers going to Boston from Provincial ports must show a doctor's certificate that the typhus has either been vaccinated, or has been a victim of smallpox during the past twelve months.
