It was declared that even should Vilna be abandoned, the enemy would find it a "victory" as barren as the occupation of the fortresses of Poland and that the Russian armies would have withdrawn all munitions of value, be-

fore giving up their ground. News from the Balkans, especially from Bulgaria, today definitely killed reports from Berlin that Bulgaria and Turkey had reached an understanding, and it was felt to be certain that when the time comes all of the Balkan nations will be found aligned with the entente nations.
