minutes, exhibiting alternately a RED

AND WHITE LIGHT. It will be visi-

ble in every direction seaward, and, it is

contemplated, may be seen at the dis-

tance of Thirty miles.

As a further guide it may be observed

that this Light kept open with Spiller's

Excellency the Governor for the Post
Office Department in this place, and
