A TOUGH NEGRO.

After Running Amuck Through a Texas Town He is Caught, Jailed, Mobbed, Riddled with Bullets and Killed Again.

DENISON, Tex., May 20.—At 9 o'clock last night a negro attacked Alice Hanna, aged 15, and a daughter of Judge Gilbert, but they succeeded in breaking from his grasp and escaped. The former received a severe gash on the forehead, and had an eye badly injured. The latter was struck in the side with a knife, which struck her corset stays, saving her life, but making a flesh wound. Continuing his course up the street, the villain then attacked a servant girl, Annie McGowan, but she escaped without injury. Her cries brought a policeman. A battle ensued. The negro was badly beaten, but he fell on the officer with a stone and escaped. Two hundred citizens gave chase. About 11 o'clock the negro was chased to Taylor town, a negro neighborhood, and after a struggle captured and carried to jail. The officers became alarmed and asked fifteen minutes to get the other prisoners out. The fifteen minutes expired and the mob clamored. The officers asked for further time. Suddenly a man boldly pushed his way through the door, axe in hand, and appeared before the cell occupied by the terrified negro. A few blows battered down the cell door, and the negro was pushed out in sight of the crowd and shoved from an elevation. Before the victim reached the ground his body was riddled with bullets. Though severely wounded he was recaptured by the authorities and securely jailed. The crowd continued in a state of excitement for some time, but the officers finally persuaded them to disperse.
