OPPOSITION TO VALLEY ROUTE.

In these later days it appears possible to secure the acquiescence of commissions and experts to any desire which the Government of the day may intimate is in its party interest. The extraordinary report of Mr. Lumsden, Chief Engineer of the Transcontinental Railway Commission, brought down in Parliament last week, brings this point prominently to the front and particularly interests the large number of Canadians living along the St. John River. Mr. Lumsden first seeks to create the impression that the Central route of the proposed railway through this province is much shorter than that by the way of the Valley of the St. John. In the interest of the preponderant influence of the Nova Scotia members, every effort has been exerted by the engineers in the work to secure some seeming facts to gloss over their ridiculous propositions. Survey after survey has been made along the Central route in order that a foot might be gained here and there, and the proposed road made as near an airline as possible on paper. Little attention has been paid to the Valley route and no serious attempt has been made to find a more favorable line than that surveyed years ago. Indeed, what little has been done has apparently been undertaken with the idea of strengthening the hands of the opponents of this route. Mr. Lumsden in his report says that the Central route is entirely without railway communication, while the Valley route is already supplied with railway facilities and will more-over be connected with the Transcontinental Railway at a number of points. Mr. Lumsden must know that this is not true. The people living along the St. John River, in which section are to be found the most fertile lands in Canada and settled throughout its entire length, have absolutely no railway facilities whatever, and the full measure of their prosperity has been thereby much restricted in the past. This report of Mr. Lumsden's has been in the hands of the Government for a long time and the public knew nothing of the erroneous impressions which it sought to convey to the Government, for what purposes it can be readily surmised. It remained for Mr. Crockett, the member for York, to elicit the contents of the report from the Government and give the people who are so vitally interested a chance to, at least refute many of the statements therein contained. In estimating the comparative cost for bridging on the two routes, Mr. Lumsden says that a costly bridge would have to be constructed at Fredericton. Why is this necessary? The Government already owns a fine structure at the required point, and there can be no possible necessity of erecting another. But the cost of the Valley route must be padded to enormous proportions to enable the Central route to have a seeming advantage. We doubt if there is a reputable engineer in Canada, unbiased by party leanings, who would say that the Valley route would be more expensive than the Central. On the other hand we are assured that such an engineer would not only say that it would be the cheaper to construct, but that it would be the shorter line of the two, and also that the grades would be so much easier, that the Central would not stand in comparison with the Valley route.
