A LOCAL PULP MILL.—It now looks as if the Cushing pulp mill will be built and by local capitalists. It is understood Mr. George S. Cushing has succeeded in interesting a number of prominent merchants, including some other mill owners, in the project and that the necessary capital will be forthcoming. The hope and expectation is to have the mill in full running order by next fall. The work of organizing the company is being vigorously prosecuted.—Globe.

PREPARING FOR SPRING.—The St. John Sun says it is evident that the Star Line intend to keep their promise to improve the service for tourist travel on the St. John River. There is a big gang of men at work on the David Weston renewing her saloon, putting in a new barriecan deck, some deck sheathing and a portion of main deck. The Weston will be refurnished, newly carpeted throughout in the saloons and fully prepared as a mate for the Victoria on river route during the coming season.

SEED WHEAT.—It is proposed by the Department of Agriculture of the New Brunswick Government to import a quantity of the best varieties of seed wheat in time for distribution for spring seeding. Providing there is a pretty general desire for same from the farmers of the province. The intention is to sell this seed to the farmers at cost. Those in this part, Queens Co., who desire seed wheat will please drop a postal card to H. B. Hall, Gagetown, informing him the amount required, so he can forward the same to the department, thereby giving them an idea of the amount required. This matter should be attended to without delay.

COMMITTED FOR TRIAL.—Peter D. Reid, the unfortunate bridegroom, who has been spending his honeymoon in the county jail, charged with the serious crime of forgery, had his preliminary examination completed at the police court Thursday morning. The present in court and testimony of the witnesses was read or written and Reid had not understood the proceedings. After hearing his evidence, the court committed the prisoner for trial at the next session of the County Court, which opens on the 15th inst. Wesley VanWart, Q. C., has been retained for the defence.—Fredericton Herald.

Mr. G. H. V. Bulyea, who is on his way to the Yukon writes to his mother here, which will be of interest to our readers, his letter is as follows:—

SKAGWAY, Feb. 11.—Arrived at Skagway last evening and will send this back on the boat. Skagway is a nicely laid out town at the foot of the hills. To use a western phrase it is a swift place. There are dance halls by the dozens. Every other place is a saloon and there are more gambling games than I ever heard tell of. A few of us made the rounds last night and took in the sights. The White Pass is in good shape and we will get over easily in a couple of days and then you will hear from me only when I get a chance to send a letter out.

Funeral of Mrs. Margaret Cameron.

The oldest resident of Mill Cove has recently passed in the person of Mrs. Margaret Cameron who died on March 1st. She had completed her 80th year, and was thus little short of 90 years of age. This great esteem in which she was held was manifested in the large attendance at her memorial service on Thursday morning, March 8th., the Baptist meeting house at Mill Cove being crowded with a reverent and deeply affected congregation. All the central seats were occupied by mourners. The service was conducted by the pastor Rev. C. W. Townsend who was assisted by Revs. A. B. Macdonald and G. W. Springer. The sermon was preached by Mr. Townsend from the words: "I shall be satisfied when I awake with Thy likeness." Psalm 17: verse 15. The preacher referred to the limited knowledge possessed by the Old Testament saints concerning another world; but pointed out that there were some who in the strength and clearness of their faith seemed to herald the coming of a clearer day of revelation. Among such was David who uttered these words; and he (the preacher) would ask his hearers to ponder this statement of the Old Testament in the light of the New. The language contained (1) An Implication: It was implied that here below there was no satisfaction for a child of God. It affirmed (2) An Expectation: I shall be satisfied. And it anticipated (3) A Transformation: "When I awake with Thy likeness." These thoughts were elaborated in an earnest discourse, which concluded with a solemn application to the unconverted. After the sermon the Rev. G. W. Springer made some feeling and fervent remarks in reference to the deceased. He spoke of her zealous character, and told how once by her strong faith and glowing testimony she turned the tide in a series of meetings when the interest appeared to be dying out. The Rev. A. B. Macdonald also paid his tribute to the character of the departed. He related how she had walked by the shores of the Grand Lake from Waterborn to Jemseg and back on the occasion of her baptism. He mentioned other interesting circumstances and emphasized the appeals made by the previous speakers.

At the close of the service a large number availed themselves of the sad privilege of looking for the last time upon the serene face of the aged saint.
