syard; the animals are allowed free access to the bastere at all times, and the observing man will often see poor stock wandering over the pastures in March and April in search of a spear of grass; while many of our farmers who are not in the habit of following such methods with their stock will turn to grass two or three weeks too soon if they happen to be short of hay and it is a trifle high in price. When pastures are so treated there is neven any feed and the stock is always poor. Many pastures contain no shelter, not even a tree to protect the stock from the sun; and more than this—I have seen cattle stand in stagnant pools of water to get away fram the beat and flies, and they were foresed to drink the same impure fifthy water or go without.

I might follow this kind of a farmer to his winter care of stock—with cold stables, poor and insufficient feed, and a hole in the for a water supply—but time will not permit nor, do you care to hear it.

The first essential to success in the animal industry is good stock. Every farmer must desid for hisself how much and what kind of stock he will carry.
