In a department store not far from here two girls, Miss S. and Miss E., work side by side at the glove counter.

The requirements of this shop as to the attractive appearance of its girls are very strict, and Miss S., the girl who stands farthest from the door on the L. street side, has several times brought down the criticism of the forewoman upon her because her clothes did not look nice enough. Considering the fact that she gets but eight dollars a week such a criticism seems rather trying, doesn't it?

But the girl who works nearest the door, Miss S., far from being criticised, is always so neatly dressed that customers frequently stop and admire her and wonder how she does it. And she also gets but eight dollars a week.

A day or two after New Year's when some organizing in the shop was going on and several girls were to be discharged, the forewoman who really wanted to keep Miss E. because she was a good saleswoman, despite her unsatisfactory appearance, conceived a plan.

She summoned both the girls to the office and put it up to them this way: "Both you girls are getting eight dollars a week. Now how much do you pay at home for board?"

Both paid three dollars a week.

"What do you do with the rest of your money?"

"Clothes mostly," said Miss E. despairingly.

"I save a dollar a week and most of the rest goes for clothes," said Miss S.

"Well," said the forewoman, bluntly, "that means that you spend about a dollar a week less on your clothes than Miss E. and you look about fifty per cent. better. Do you think you could tell her how you do it?"

"I guess it's because of that dollar less," said Miss S. "You see I have

saved about that ever since I've been here and I've got over a hundred dollars in the bank, and that makes it possible for me to take advantage of every bargain I see.

"You know," addressing Miss E., "you came in just yesterday and told me about a lovely dress marked down from forty to fifteen dollars that would be just the thing to wear in the shop, but you said you hadn't the money and when you did have it the dress would be gone, and that that was always the way.

"And it would be with me too if I didn't have that money saved. I like to have it saved anyway because it would be fine if I should be sick or anything, but it does me even more good this way.

"I always keep a few dollars in my bureau drawer and I never let a chance to get what I need at a reasonable price go by. I never buy anything at regular prices. There's not a thing I've got but would cost me from one-third to two-thirds more if I didn't buy it at just the right time. The dress that I've worn all this winter and that you girls think is so swell I bought in the last spring marked down sale, marked from thirty-eight to fifteen dollars. It came from a store that's enough ahead of the styles so that it won't look old-fashioned and it's got so little trimming and such nice goods that it doesn't look shabby yet, and will do me for a rainy day dress next winter."

"Do you think you could learn to save and do like Miss S. if I'd give you a chance to learn?" asked the forewoman.

"I'll begin next pay day," answered Miss E., "and save a dollar."

"If you'll keep it up for six months I'll raise your pay to nine and yours has already been raised to that, Miss S.," said the forewoman.

I wonder if she will keep it up. I wonder too if any of the other girls whose purchasing power might be so vastly increased by such a find will take the hint and do likewise.

750 Feet Skyscraper

To be Erected at New York at Cost of \$12,000,000.

New York, Jan. 20.—Manhattan Island, which already has the two tallest masonry buildings in the world, is to have a third, taller than either the Singer Building or the Metropolitan Towers. F. W. Woolworth, the 5 and 10 cent store man, who is building it, announced.

The new structure will stand on Lower Broadway between Barclay St. and Park Place overlooking City Hall Square and occupying an entire block at the base; the extreme height is to be 750 feet, and the cost will be approximately \$12,000,000.

The height of the Metropolitan Tower is 700 feet, and the Singer Building 612 feet.

SOME FIGURES.

The London Statist has been writing up John Bull as a financier, and produces some wonderful figures for our delectation.

The inhabitants of Great Britain, notwithstanding the limited extent of the natural resources of their own country, and their need to purchase from other lands, and to transport from distant parts of the earth the greater portion of their supplies of food and raw materials, have been so successful in overcoming the obstacles placed in their path by nature that they have not only had the means of purchasing all the food, raw materials, and manufactured goods they have needed to buy from other lands for their own consumption and maintenance, but they have been able to create so much surplus wealth that they have supplied other nations with visible capital, to the extent of nearly \$16,000,000,000, as well as with a large amount of private capital, so that the total sum provided is estimated to be upwards of \$17,500,000,000. The days of miracles are supposed to have passed, but had anyone predicted two generations ago that in 1910 Great Britain would possess this great wealth abroad, over and above the vastly increased wealth of her people at home, the prediction would have been regarded as beyond the possibility of realization.

The direct earnings of the British people from their investments abroad, now reaches an enormous sum. In the paper it is shown that the investment of about \$13,500,000,000 of British capital up to the end of 1907 in other lands gave a direct income of \$700,000,000 a year to this country, and it is fair to assume that the investment of nearly \$16,000,000,000 gives a return of about \$850,000,000 a year, a sum which comes to us in the produce of the countries in which we have invested capital, and thus provides us with no inconsiderable part of the supplies of food and raw materials we obtain from abroad.

But the indirect advantages of the capital investments are quite as important as the direct advantages. By means of the capital which our investors have supplied, the young countries and India have so greatly expanded their productions of food and raw materials that they have had the means not only of paying the interest due by them to Great Britain, but of purchasing greatly increased quantities of British goods. The prosperity of Great Britain, which has provided the capital, has been stimulated in three ways.

First, the remittance of capital to other lands has created a greatly increased demand for British goods.

Second, the remittance of the interest upon the capital has increased Great Britain's purchasing power, and has given her the means of paying for a large part of her supplies of food and raw materials.

Third, the investment of British capital abroad has greatly increased the production of other countries and given them the means of purchasing additional quantities of British goods.

In the Daughter States of the Empire and in India the investment of British capital has been very great; in the aggregate it reaches \$7,770,000,000, of which \$415,000,000 has been supplied in the present year. In the three Daughter States of Canada, Australia and South Africa, the amount reaches nearly \$5,500,000,000—a very large sum when we recollect that the total population of these three countries is only 20,000,000.
