The local sealing steamers which will prosecute in the Gulf will leave here on March 10th for Channel, their port of clearance, not taking any chance of being detained here as was the case last spring. So far as is known now three steamers from St. John's are going to the Gulf, namely, Viking, Diana and Ranger, and the ships have all their crews, totalling 550 men, already secured.

Inter-Collegiate Hockey

For Patriotic Purposes Contemplated—Proposed Visit of Canadian Team Being Favourably Considered.

Having had the matter under consideration for several days past, the management of the Prince's Rink are inclined to be in favor of getting an outside Canadian team to come to St. John's this winter to play a series of hockey matches with a representative city team, the entire net proceeds to be given to the W. P. A. Fund. The main part of the project to be dealt with is the question of finance and a guarantee from ten persons is necessary to cover the expenses, such as transportation, board, etc., of the visitors.

We understand that the idea has been entertained by some of our public-spirited hockey enthusiasts and citizens who have offered themselves as guarantors. Matters in that direction will be finalized, it is expected, to-night or not later than Monday night next. No time will be lost in opening up negotiations with outside hockeyists and all the necessary arrangements made here. In all probability a Sydney team will be invited.
