SAFEGUARDING PETROGRAD.

LONDON, To-day.

It is officially announced in Stockholm that Russia has ordered mines to be laid around Aland Island as far as Swedish territorial waters. Aland Island is in the Baltic Sea and commands the waterway entering the Gulf of Bothnia as well as the entrance to the Gulf of Finland, and hence the way to Petrograd.

THE RAILWAY STRIKE.

WASHINGTON, To-day.

Representatives of the railroads, train men's brotherhood and shipping representatives argued for nine hours to-day to defer the Senate's interstate commerce commission on the legislation proposed to avert the threatened strike and to recompense the roads for any added financial burden of a perfect machinery to make impossible in the future another crisis like the present. Last night the committee worked until late on a bill to be presented to the Senate to-morrow. Out of the nine hours argument two facts stood clearly in the estimation of all affected parties: Congress alone can prevent the strike and the public eventually will foot the bill for an eight hour day with ten hours pay which the trainmen demand. The railroad executive and shippers insisted that the strike order should be postponed. Four brotherhood chiefs declared with equal vehemence that it could not be. All sides, apparently, were more or less satisfied with the hearing which had given them the opportunity to lay their cases before the public.

THE BALKANS.

LONDON, To-day.

The whole interest of the war just now is focussed on the Balkans and the German Field Marshal Von Hindenburg. Rumania's participation is considered here as important not only from the accession of a new fresh army but from the opportunity it gives the Russian army to extend its base and to co-operate with Rumania upon Galician and Transylvanian territory, practically as one army, against the Austrians. Another important factor is the closing of the Danube, which has been the principal route for the shipment of munitions from Germany to Turkey and the shipping of supplies to Germany. Reports differ as to whether the Central Powers were prepared for Rumania's entry. While an Austrian official message asserts that Austria-Hungary was prepared for the new development, other despatches and newspapers say that the Central Powers were so confident of Rumania's neutrality that they left the boundary very thinly guarded. They are hurrying reinforcements from every quarter, while the inhab-

GERMAN PLANS COMPLETELY UP-SET.

LONDON, To-day.
Advices to the Central News from Petrograd says Rumania's action has entirely upset the plans of the German staff. The projected blow at Brussiloff's flank is rendered impossible. Rumania's military scheme has been submitted for approval by the Russian staff. Transylvania is believed still to be the chief theatre of operations. The relations between Austria and Hungary are critical and the latter is clamoring for a concentration of the entire Hungarian forces on their own frontiers. There is a possibility of Hungary fighting Austria for her own preservation.

ROUMANIAN SUCCESSES.

BUCHAREST, To-day.
The Rumanian troops invading Transylvania have occupied the important industrial centre of Petrooseny and the Tarling Valley near Kronstadt, says an announcement of the Rumanian War Office. The losses were very slight.

THE SENATE TAKING ACTION.

WASHINGTON, To-day.
Measures which will result in the rescinding of the orders for the railway strike next Monday may be passed by the House and Senate under a special rule to-day, and within 24 hours may be on the way to receive President Wilson's signature.

WHAT THE STRIKE WILL MEAN.

NEW YORK, To-day.
The ultimate consumer got a bitter foretaste of the railroad strike conditions to-day from a sharp advance in the price of food. Dealers attributed the rise to embargoes on perishable products put into effect last night by several eastern railroads and to the prospects of a serious shortage of supplies as soon as the strike is called.

THE COST OF VERDUN.

PARIS, To-day.
Competent authorities estimate that about 500,000 Germans have been disabled in the Verdun region alone since February 21st, the beginning of the great German offensive there. The total number of wounded German prisoners taken in the Verdun sector and in the neighborhood of the Somme exceeds 43,000.

THE RESULT OF LEGISLATION.

WINNIPEG, To-day.
Statistics compiled by J. N. McLean, Chief of the License Inspectors for Manitoba, have proved a revelation regarding the effect of the Manitoba Temperance Act. The number of crimes in the province. There had been a reduction of 80% in drunkenness in Winnipeg since June, as compared with the three months previous. The percentage being based on court statistics. In the province there has been a decrease of 90% in drunkenness.

RIOT IN LISBON.

LISBON, To-day.
Several persons were wounded in conflicts between civilians and troops last night near the House of Parliament. These clashes followed a session of Parliament which adopted several military measures recommended by the Minister of War and a resolution of confidence in the Government.

DECISIVE RESULTS LOOKED FOR AT SALONIKA.

LONDON, To-day.
An Athens message to the Daily Mail says the Bulgarian retreat from Greece appears to have begun. Serbian cavalry has arrived at the entrance of Salonika. The Bulgarians further south at Elavits and Tsartailar have been forced to evacuate their positions at Patoli. The last Bulgarian position of the Serbian left flank, was evacuated yesterday. The Bulgarians in the hilly country around Banitzia tried, aided by artillery, to retake Corinthe but they were driven back with heavy losses. The Allies' artillery dominates the Bulgarian guns northeast of Banitzia. The Bulgarian forces are already reported to be marching northward to Krusograd, five miles north of Banitzia on the way to Brod Negocani and Monastir. The French press is pointing out that decisive developments are expected on the Salonika front, which will have a marked effect on the entire situation. The Main says there is but one battle front where the most rapid and decisive results must be obtained, and that is the Salonika front.

SERBIANS DEFEAT THE BULGARS.

LONDON, To-day.
A correspondent with the Serbian army at Salonika on August 30th telegraphs that the Bulgarian offensive in the Ostrovo region appears to be temporarily, if not definitely, broken. The Serbians occupying very strong positions stood their ground magnificently, inflicting such enormous losses on the enemy that the Bulgarians' victory, of which the Bulgarian communiques boasted, should more properly be described as a staggering defeat. It is known with certainty here that the Bulgarians have been experiencing the greatest difficulties in conveying their numerous wounded to the rear in spite of the fact that they enjoy the use of a railroad between Banitzia and Florina.

ROUMANIANS NEAR KRONSTADT.

LONDON, To-day.
A Rumanian force on Sunday night descended the slopes of the Carpathians and occupied the district around Kronstadt, says a despatch to the Times from Bucharest.

SAGONA HEARD FROM.

—The Field Nfd. Co. received a message from Capt. Parsons of the S.S. Sagona, stating that the ship arrived at Italian Harbor on August 28th. W. S. W. and Mrs. Hook and Linere from there to Macovic doing poorly, at Hopedale not much doing. The Sagona is now coming South and will arrive here late Wednesday morning.

BULGARIA DECLARES WAR ON ROUMANIA.

LONDON, To-day.
Bulgaria has declared war on Rumania, according to an official announcement at Saloniki.

MORE TROUBLE IN GREECE.

LONDON, To-day.
Despatches from Saloniki say there has been fighting between the Greek garrison at Saloniki and Greek volunteers recently organized to assist the Greek regulars who are resisting the Bulgarians in Macedonia. French troops intervened to suppress fighting and the garrison surrendered and marched out of Saloniki.

GERARD TO ACT FOR ROUMANIA.

BERLIN To-day.
The American Ambassador Gerard has received instructions to take over the protection of Rumanian interests if agreeable to Germany.

CONSTANTINE HAS ABDICATED.

LONDON, To-day.
King Constantine of Greece, has abdicated, according to an official British press report at Saloniki. The report says the King has abdicated in favor of the Crown Prince with Venizelos as a power behind the throne. The new policy, he reports, will be to work with the Entente Allies. According to this information Premier Zeamle will remain at the head of the Government. The correspondent questions whether the Entente Allies desire the active assistance of Greece.

COMMITTEE TAKES OVER GREEK GARRISONS.

LONDON, To-day.
The surrender of several Greek garrisons to a committee which has taken over the administration of part of Greece, Macedonia is reported in a despatch from Saloniki. According to this despatch the garrisons at Saloniki, Voden and Fort Little, Karacurum have surrendered to the committee on its face. This despatch indicates that a revolution is under way in Greece.
