Those who witnessed the magnifirespondent who was there at the away. time and who knows Brazil well tells me that throughout the country right from the beginning of the war, Brazil has shown a splendidly ben evolent attitude towards us, and that nothing is to be feared even from the thousands of Germans who have set led, more particularly in the Southern States, in what are more or less erman communities. The Brazilians emselves are engaged in the grow ing of coffee, but the Germans have handled the exportation to Europe, which in pre-war days was done main by way of Hamburg. They do not ook upon German raiders with friendy eyes; and I am assured that they will be found in the main loyal to the ountry of their adoption.

Killed in Action.

In yesterday's casualty list appeard the name of Lance-Corporal Herert Harding, 7 Cabot Street, as "Killed in Action" on April 23rd. The dead oldier left here with the first contin gent and passed through several stiff engagements at Gallipoli and in France, but on the date given surendered his young life to the great cause. Left to mourn is a young wife and four tiny children, to whom the Telegram offers deep sympathy. Royal Naval Reservist John Miller, of Portugal Cove, is a brother of Mrs. Harding.
