## Women and Freemasonry.

The latest craze of the moment for women is to turn Freemasons writes "Friend in Town" in the Glasgow Weekly Herald, and it is distinctly interesting to see how the movement progresses, in spite of the discouragement of Grand Lodge, who have apparently made up their minds to have nothing whatever to do with women and to excommunicate with bell, book, and candle every Mason who touches the accursed thing. But, in spite of this, the women seem to be persisting, and from the latest accounts that I have heard, the feminine Masons already number several thousands. They claim to know the secrets and to have been initiated into all the mysteries, and one woman, I see, professes to have reached the 33rd degree, which I understand, is the limit to which any mere male person can hope to progress. I had always supposed that Masonry was the one channel which women could not hope to follow, but now that all the professions are open to us, and that we are holding our own at rowing and football and tennis, I am beginning to wonder whether any outward difference will remain between the two sexes. Of course, there was once a genuine lady Mason—a Miss St. Leger, who, I think, became afterwards Mrs. Aldworth. Beset with curiosity she hid in a grandfather clock at her father's house during an initiation, and, having discovered more than an outsider should know, she was in consequence formally enrolled. The present movement began in France, but there is no doubt it has spread—and is still spreading—in this country. Whether it will end in recognition or anathema remains to be seen. But I candidly confess, from the little I know of Freemasonry, I cannot reconcile the feminine character with the tenets of the craft. We do sometimes find it hard to keep a secret don't we?

### Collided With Pole.

Motor Car Comes Off Second Best.  
 A Dorr motor car now lies in a badly damaged condition near Littlefield, as a result of a collision with a telegraph pole. How the accident occurred or to whom the car belongs is unknown, but that it might have had serious consequences is very evident. The car is piled up on the embankment on the Littlefield side of the road and the pole lies in front of it. The wind shield of the car escaped damage, and it was very fortunate for the occupants that the pole fell in the opposite direction.

### Family Marooned for Three Weeks.

To be marooned on a tiny island in Whitefish Bay, near Sault Ste. Marie, suffering from lack of food and exposure to recent storms was the experience of Harry Murry, his wife and three children. On September 27, Murry, a cranberry picker, and his family, were landed at Iroquois Island by a man named Mills, who was buying cranberries. They had a small tent and enough food for a week, during which they expected to pick berries in the marshes. Mills was to call for them. Shortly after Mills left them his boat was seized by creditors, and when the time came to go after the Murrys he had no boat nor money to secure one.

According to the story told by Murry when he was taken to Sault Ste. Marie, the family had little to live on except fish, wild duck and cranberries for nearly two weeks. Ammunition was giving out and it was necessary to keep the camp fire going at all times because of the lack of matches. Had the fire gone out the suffering from cold would have been serious, as the temperature has been below freezing. There are no buildings on the island except the rude shack they constructed.
