THE PROPOSED SERVICE.

A schedule of places is contained in the advertisement for two suitable steamers to ply between St. John's and the West Indies, and it is proposed to take in ports in British and French islands, as well as Cuba and Porto Rico. It is not contemplated yet to have the service link up British Guiana. That may come. The British islands are Bahamas, Jamaica, Turks, St. Kitts, Dominica, St. Vincent, Grenada, Barbados, Virgins, St. Lucia, Tobago and Trinidad. These have an area of nearly thirteen thousand square miles, and a population of about one million, four hundred thousand. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 1921, the principal imports from the British West Indies into this country were: Fruits to the value of \$947; Spices to the value of \$235; 11,810 Gallons of Rum, valued at \$12,991; 256,583 pounds of Sugar, valued at \$37,909; Manufactures of Tobacco, 4052 pounds, valued at \$17,504; 672,773 gallons of molasses, of a valuation of \$706,637. The total value of all imports for the annual period given, according to Customs Returns, was \$794,359. Molasses, Sugar and Rum were the three staples, and when the package contents of cargoes are approximated, it may merely be asked, is it necessary to subsidize large steamers to take this carrying trade away from Newfoundland shipping? The answer is obvious. Newfoundland exports for the same period, (1920-21,) were: Dried Cod, 124,760 qtls.; Dried Haddock, 2,359 quintals; Dried Ling, 133 quintals; Pickled Herring, 9,223 barrels; Pickled Salmon, 829 tierces; Pickled Sea Trout, 148 barrels; 6 Cases Lobsters; 25 M. Lumber; 3 Tuns Cod Oil; 11 Cases Tinned Salmon; 1900 pounds dried Squid. The total value of all exports of Newfoundland produce being \$1,126,392. Most of this was shipped in local bottoms, thus giving employment to ships and men, which would otherwise have had to lay up for want of freights and charters. Yet to-day the Government proposes, to all intents and purposes, to put these vessels at their moorings and their crews on shore, for no other result can obtain if this proposed steam service agreement is entered into. So far as the French West Indies are concerned the value of the 1920-21 imports from these was \$2,239; of exports \$246,376. Our trade with Cuba and Porto Rico direct amounts of late years to practically nothing. We have but little hope of entering into competition with the sup pliers of the latter markets under existing circumstances. On the whole, therefore, would it not be much more advisable to refrain from costly experiments and direct more energy to holding those markets which we have, or at least until the mercantile interests of the whole

country ask for direct communication by steam with the islands of the Antilles. As yet the Trade has not moved publicly. It may have the whole matter under consideration, or it may on the other hand be regarding the project as a joke, and one which is foredoomed to meet with failure. Hence the silence.

PUTS THROUGH IMPORTANT INSURANCE DEAL.

One of the largest reinsurance deals involving over fifty millions of assurance has just been completed and to-day the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada received a remittance of nearly seven million dollars in connection with this business. When the war broke out in 1914 American life assurance companies ceased to issue further policies in most parts of the world outside of the United States and Canada. Their foreign agency organizations have thus largely disintegrated and to resume active operations now would mean the building up of entirely new organizations at a time when they are able to secure within the limits of their own country all the new business the law allows them to write. On the other hand the agency organizations of the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada in the same countries are active and vigorous. During the past few months agreements have been made by two of the great New York companies by which the Sun Life re-assures most of their business outside of the United States, Canada and Europe. The policies thus transferred amount to about \$50,000,000 and the proportion of the assets of the American companies which has been, or is being handed over as belonging to these policies is about \$24,000,000.

The last of these arrangements has just been completed and the Sun Life has to-day received a further remittance of \$5,859,000. These various agreements have not merely been formally approved, but merely by the companies, but by the Superintendents of Insurance for the State of New York and for the Dominion of Canada. They constitute one of the most important reinsurance transactions ever completed between life companies of this continent.

Furious Driving.

EXPRESSMAN FINED.

Two young men, drivers of aerated water wagons, summoned at the instance of Constable Bennett for furious driving on Circular Road, on the morning of the third inst., were each fined five dollars and costs.

Messrs. H.E. Knight and F. W. Ayre appeared for the prosecution. Giving evidence, Mr. Knight stated that the morning after the Regatta he saw two express horses driving in an exceedingly furious manner, one behind the other, on Circular Road. The driver behind was trying to pass the other in front, who prevented it by pulling his horse across the road. This was repeated three times. Mr. Knight said he never saw such furious and reckless driving in all his life, and an accident was only averted only by a miracle. Mr. Ayre stated he saw the horses going at full gallop and he did not understand why there was not a collision. The accused denied that they were racing, but admitted they were going at a good pace in order to get through with their work.

Cow Case Dismissed.

The "jumping" cow case, which occupied the attention of Judge McCarthy last week, was concluded to-day, when the action was dismissed. The plaintiff sued for damages to a field of oats caused by a cow owned by a neighbour. The animal jumped over a stone wall to get into the field. At last hearing some witnesses said the wall was over 6 feet high; others said it was only one and a half feet. The defendant's lawyer and Sgt. Fitzgerald viewed the fence on Sunday and gave evidence to-day that it was not substantial. Special witnesses for the plaintiff were also called in before the Judge gave his decision.

Requiem Mass At Belvidere.

There was a very large attendance at the annual Requiem Mass at Belvidere this morning. Rev. Dr. Greene was celebrant with Rev. Fr. Kennedy as deacon and Rev. W. Sullivan as sub-deacon. During the week painters were at work on the Mortuary Chapel and the caretaker, Mr. O'Toole, had a number of men employed fixing up the graves and walks. The grounds this morning presented a neat and orderly appearance.

Civil Court.

SEVERAL COMMERCIAL CASES.
A tradesman had a number of people summoned for bills, for sums ranging from \$1 to \$20. In only one case the defendant appeared and denied the debt. The Court ordered the tradesman to produce his books before it would give judgment. A servant girl sued her master for one month's wages of \$5. The defendant claimed the girl left her place before her month was out. The amount was ordered paid less the sum of one dollar which had been advanced her on account. A medical doctor had a number of delinquents summoned. In all cases the liability was admitted. A landlord sued several tenants for arrears of rent. One woman who owed \$20 when asked why she did not pay said to the Judge, "What about fixing the steps?" His Honor replied he knew nothing about them except those taken to make her pay. Judgment for the full amount was entered.

Patient for Hospital.

MAKES MOTOR BOAT JOURNEY.
Mr. Thomas Walsh of Cape Broyle, a local builder has a motor fishing boat of which he may well feel proud. Last week he brought along a patient for the hospital, Mr. John Leahy, who had been taken suddenly ill. The distance from Cape Broyle to here, some 40 miles, was covered in less than five hours. Mr. Leahy, who is a highly respected resident of Cape Broyle arranged to come to the city by train, but could not make connections. He wired Sir Michael Cashin who kindly sent along his motor car and a trained nurse, but before the arrival of the car Mr. Leahy decided to come by motor boat. Mr. Leahy's friends will be glad to learn that his condition is much improved since entering the hospital.

NO LUMBER FOR COFFINS.

HONG KONG, Aug. 8.
The toll of dead in the Typhoon at Swatow on August 2, now reaches twenty-eight thousand. Scarcity of coffins makes it necessary to bury dead in Gunny Sacks, according to a circular of the Swatow Chamber of Commerce giving a new estimate of the dead.

HIGH FINANCE.

LONDON, Aug. 8.
It is believed that the Bankers Committee is to be reconvened shortly, for consideration of a small loan to Germany. J. P. Morgan is remaining in Europe to attend.

TRAINS RUNNING.

LIMBURG, Aug. 8.
Newcastle is occupied by the Nationalists it is reported here, and the first train, over the Cork Direct Line for weeks ran on Monday as far as Bruree.

A NEW GOSPEL FOR IRELAND.

DUBLIN, Aug. 8.
Irish Trades Union Congress opened in Dublin on Monday. Chairman Cathal O'Shannon condemned the spirit of militarism displayed by both north and south, and urged the working classes to shun political organizations and civil strife. He also denounced censorship.

Great Britain and Its Title Pest.

After reading of the discussion which has been taking place in the British House of Lords respecting titles one is more than ever inclined to agree with the request of the Canadian House of Commons some years ago, to the effect that no more titles be given to Canadians. The war and its aftermath has had an evil effect upon this title business and goodness knows it was bad enough in pre-war days. For every little service, no matter how trivial, titles of great and small degree have been spread broadcast in the Old Country. It has got so that it takes all of one's time to dodge them. Advertise yourself sufficiently as the buyer of a large amount of war loan, and bang comes a knighthood or a baronetcy. Writing a goodly amount of patriotic "boob" was another sure way to knighthood.

But worse than all this is the fact that titles are purchasable with hard cash. Of course, there is this to be said for the cash down principle, it indicates that the buyer of the bauble has some capacity, else he would not have accumulated the money, while a lot of people in England who have titles have neither capacity nor anything else that commends them. That titles are purchased for gold has been charged both in the British House of Lords and in the Commons on innumerable occasions and has never been denied. It has usually been a case of an easy method of augmenting party funds. In the present discussion in the Lords the name of Sir James Robinson of South Africa who was to have been named to the fore. It developed that General Smuts, who really deserves a title, but probably would not accept one under present conditions, was obliged to tell the South African House of Assembly that neither he nor his ministers had been consulted in respect to bestowing this Robinson person into the peerage. Whereupon the fat was in the fire and Robinson felt called upon to write the British authorities and begged to be excused.

The Humber Proposition

GOOD MAY BE DEARLY BOUGHT.

The report is current that the Humber proposition is in a fair way of accomplishment, the report being founded on a despatch received from the Prime Minister in London. It is stated that the British Government has assumed part of the guarantee asked for by the promoters of the project, and this undertaking relieves part of the burden that formed one of the largest part of the objections raised against it. The details of the supposed arrangement are not known at present. Later on, the full scope of the project will be shown, and until then it is not prudent to express any opinion upon it. The further statement has been made that the project will be under the sole charge of the British Company that figured so prominently in it when it was put before the public last winter.

The guarantee required of the Newfoundland Government is an objectionable feature in the proposition. Even if the successful operation will tend to provide employment for the people, the good may be dearly bought. The principle of the guarantee not being looked upon as a wise or sound policy. The magnitude of a work is not a sufficient reason to warrant a government in pledging the people's money any more than the undertaking of a small industry by an individual. We fear that if the principle is admitted in this case, other companies that are now operating or planning to operate the development of timber and kindred work will seek to have similar protection given them the total of which cannot mean an unbearable burden.—Hr. Grace Standard. ...
