most optimistic. His diagnosis of the nation's financial and commercial health was delivered in a vigorous, concise style, and elicited congratulations from J. Ramsey MacDonald, Leader of the Opposition for its manner, but not entirely for its substance. The Chancellor believed the country had passed the peak of depression, but warned that his hopes might yet be frustrated by untoward events on the continent or at home. He argued that it was useless to further reduce taxation at the cost of debt reduction, saying, "to postpone debt redemption, year after year, means insolvency." He dilated on disappointment as to the results of the excess profits tax. Ramsey MacDonald condemned the omission to reduce taxes on sugar, tea and other commodities. He declared this is much more needed than reduction in income tax which mainly relieved wealthy people. He warned the Chancellor that the Labor Party would offer hostile amendments to his proposals. On the whole the reception of the Budget was distinctly favorable, the strongest opposition coming from the Labor benches.

YORK AS VICEROY.
LONDON, April 16. The Duke of York, the Daily Mail declares, will be appointed Governor-General of one of the British overseas dominions in the near future.

NO SHORTAGE OF SUGAR.
BOSTON, April 16. The State Commissioner on the necessities of life, reporting to the Legislature to-day on a special investigation of the sugar situation, said that there was no shortage, present or prospective, and that recent advances were due largely to speculators, mostly on the New York Stock Exchange.

A NEW PHASE IN WILLIE'S INSANITY.
LONDON, April 16. Former Crown Prince Frederick of Germany is suffering from a progressive form of insanity. According to the reports of alienists he has turned to religion and exhausted his resources, who are forced to listen for hours to revival services conducted by him on an organ.

PROBATIONER WINS PRIZE FOR ORATORY.
MONTREAL, April 16. W. J. Kelloway, of Newfoundland, third year art student and accepted ministerial candidate won the Douglass prize in oratory at the annual oratorical contest in the Wesleyan Theological College to-night.

THE COST OF SHIPBUILDING.
LONDON, April 16. Arthur Gillingham, Managing Director of the Vickers Company, Montreal, leaving for Canada yesterday, remarked that British yards could build ships at forty percent lower than Canadian yards, due entirely to the difference in labor costs. More orders for lake freighters would likely come to British yards, he said.

NEWFOUNDLANDER WAS MEMBER OF BEMAN'S CREW.

HALIFAX, April 16. John Hodder, aged 21, of Newfoundland, was a member of the crew of the Patricia M. Beman, when she sailed from here last November for Nassau. The Beman was found abandoned yesterday off the United States Coast.
