this dye is permitted without any restrictions.

The furs most frequently dyed are rabbit skins; and it would seem that these skins are prepared, dyed, and dressed abroad, usually in Germany and Belgium, and then imported into this country. In addition to paraphenylene-diamine, another substance known as metaphenylene-diamine is used, and this also is deleterious.
