## Banana Producers in Prosperous Condition

The total value of all the bananas shipped from Jamaica in 1914 was \$1,400,000, and the quantity was about sixteen million two hundred thousand stems, says the Kingston Gleaner. Nearly twelve and a half million stems of this fruit were exported by us last year, and the value estimated at \$2,250,000, an increase of over three-quarters from the previous year. It is obvious from these figures that the value of bananas has doubled since 1914; nor is this due merely to the difference between the pre-war purchasing power of money and its purchasing power at the present time. That difference is striking, but it does not amount to a diminution of fifty per cent. Banana prices have risen partly because there is a greater demand than ever before for the commodity, the supply having lagged behind. Consequently the Jamaica fruit producers are now in a better position than ever before; their profits are larger, their markets more secure. Never, indeed, was the situation of the banana producer so excellent as it is at the present time. Jamaica still stands as the premier banana-producing country in the world; its annual output is larger than that of any other country. What is Jamaica's capacity in banana production? We have gone as high as nearly seventeen million stems; we did that in 1911. But since 1914 we have never reached quite thirteen million stems—we are speaking of our production for export only. Can we get back to the sixteen million standard? It is said that we shall do so this year; if that forecast proves correct our fruit exports should be valued at something like three million sterling—a record for Jamaica. But even if we produce but about thirteen million stems this year the value of that quantity may be some two and a half million sterling, an amount representing the total value of our exports in many a pre-war year. With such an economic culture, too, we need never fear prolonged periods of depression, provided always that we keep our markets by producing satisfactory fruit. Once again, then, the banana is in the ascendant; yet we are fortunate enough to find that cane also has now a future of great promise and that its cultivation is readily expanding in Jamaica. Sir Francis Watts said to us, just before he left Jamaica last week, that sugar had excellent prospects for years to come, and in a recent publication on sugar, issued in America, the same thing is stated. Thus both our chief staples occupy at present a firm position.

### City of Portland

WILL DISPLAY COPY OF FAMOUS FRENCH STATUE.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 9.—(A.P.)—This city is to have a copy in bronze of the equestrian statue of Joan of Arc by the French sculptor Fremiet, which stands in the Place de Rivoli in Paris, in front of the Louvre. Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, who recently donated to the city a statue of Theodore Roosevelt mounted upon a horse as a Rough Rider, announced that he had ordered the statue. It is expected to be delivered here in June. Dr. Coe will present the city also with statues of George Washington, Abraham Lincoln and Dr. John McLaughlin, the latter known as the "Father of Oregon," a factor of the Hudson Bay Company in the early days.

## The Campaign Against Tuberculosis

ATLANTA, May 12.—(A.P.)—Over \$200,000 annually is being spent in six different laboratories co-operating with the National Tuberculosis Association in a search for a cure for tuberculosis, according to an announcement made tonight at the opening session of the 20th annual meeting of the association by Dr. Livingston Farrand, president of the association. Dr. Farrand recalled the progress made in the tuberculosis campaign during the last 20 years. He pointed out that while the emphasis in the campaign in 1914 was laid largely upon measures to prevent the infection caused by tuberculosis, to-day, because of increased scientific knowledge, greater emphasis is being laid upon measures to build up the general health so as to resist the germ of the disease with which a greater majority of people are already infected. When the National Tuberculosis Association was formed 20 years ago, there was only a few tuberculosis associations organized to prevent the disease. Dr. Farrand pointed out that to-day there is a state tuberculosis association in every state and that there are 1,350 local tuberculosis associations, and that practically every state and local health department is giving attention to the control of tuberculosis. This progress is due very largely to the constantly increasing revenue being brought in by the annual sale of Christmas seals.

The death rate from tuberculosis, Dr. Farrand pointed out, has been cut in half, and because there are many things that are not yet known regarding tuberculosis, more study and research concerning the disease is needed. "We seek to know primarily," said Dr. Farrand, "why it is that tuberculosis develops in an individual formerly healthy although infected, who lives in good surroundings, and who for no apparent reason suddenly develops the symptoms of active tuberculosis. We also need further information as to what part is played by nutrition, by fatigue and what results might occur if it were possible to produce in any locality in a civilized part of the globe a civilized people who in adult life were freed from the infection of tuberculosis and who then were suddenly exposed to the tubercle bacillus."

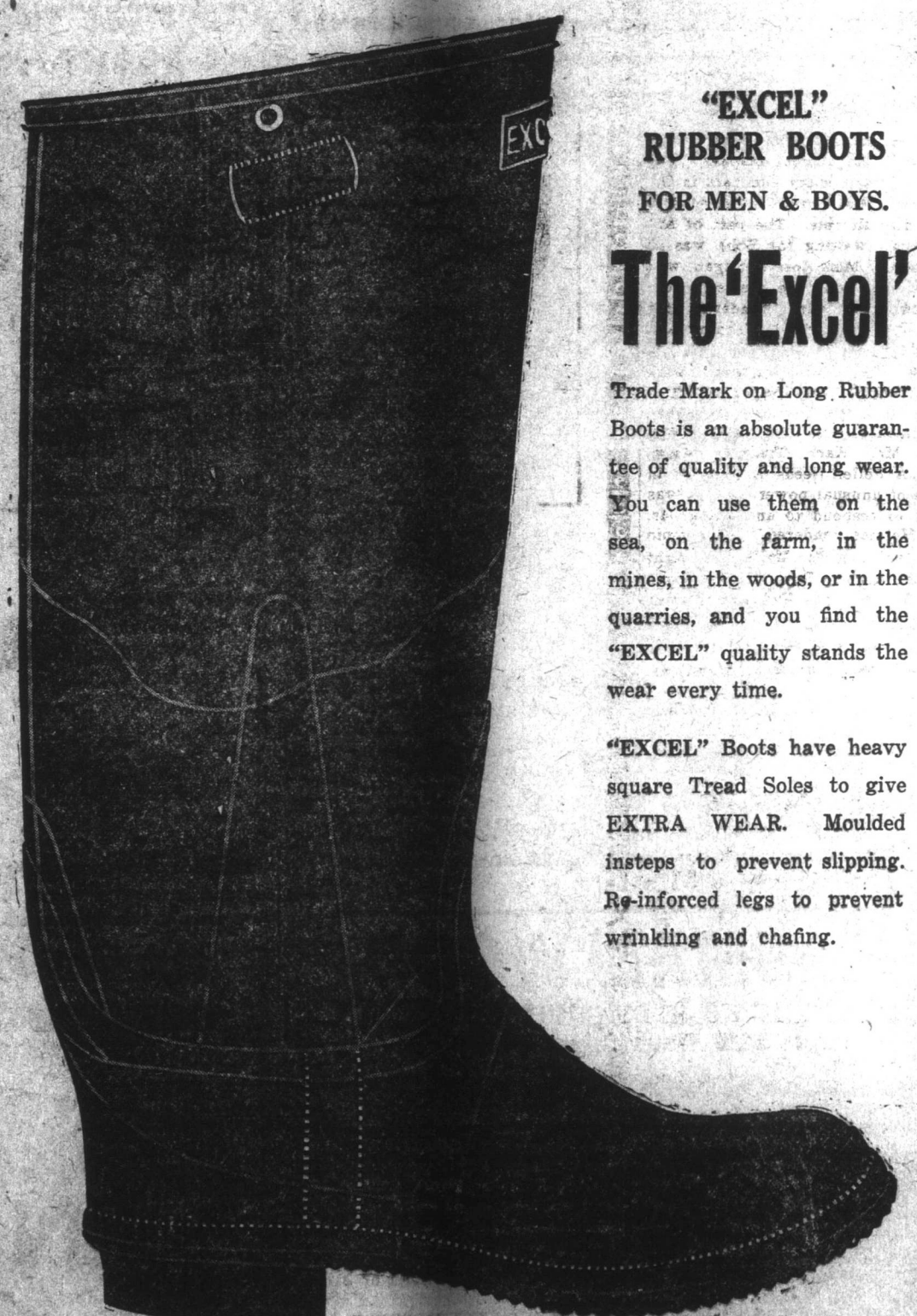
