ELEVATION — Height of light from high water to focal plane—27 feet.

STRUCTURE—Square wooden structure, sloping sides, painted white, lantern red.

"Everything arranged; the Y.M.C.A. will look after you. The Newfoundlanders are the first team to enter. The numbers have been drawn as follows:—Bell, 1; O'Toole, 2; Stone, 3; Ralph, 4."

BICYCLE RECORD BROKEN.

MONTBERRY, Seine et Oise, France, Oct. 2.—Leon Vanderstuyt, Belgian cyclist, yesterday broke the world's record for one hour's riding, paced by motor cycles, coming in that time 115.098 kilometres (71.476 miles) on a track of two and a half kilometres. The former record was 112.400 kilometres in an hour.

THE HALIFAX ROAD RACE.

Editor Evening Telegram
Dear Sir:—I understand that it is the intention of The Nfld. Amateur Athletic Association to send Ron O'Toole and other athletes to Halifax to compete for the 10-Mile Modified Marathon and other sports.

If so, then it may not be considered presumptuous on my part if I, who was President of the N.A.A.A. when Bell, Butler, Phelan and Skirving went to Halifax and covered themselves with glory by coming back, every man of them, with trophies won against the picked athletes of Eastern Canada, say a few words on this matter.

Probably you will remember that previously to our sending these men, Jim Vinicombe, that good old sport, champion one hundred yards and

quarter mile sprinter in his day, went with Jack Bell to take part in the 10-Mile Race, but Bell got sick. A couple of years after we sent Bell and the others, O'Toole went up to Halifax, but developed boils. To me that condition of affairs should not have been. It showed bad management or bad training; something wrong somewhere.

Had Bell or his managers explicitly followed our instructions there is no doubt in my mind, but that he would have done what he was sent up to do, that is, bring back the 10-Mile Halifax Road Trophy. He, however, took part in the Halifax Wanderers' sports, in which the best men of Eastern Canada competed. He romped home, easily first, in the 5-Mile race, the big event of the meet. That, of course, gave his head away with the result that it was felt they had not a man in Eastern Canada in Bell's class, and as it would never do to let the cup go to poor old Newfoundland (that would be too terrible an indignity, the wires were pulled to bring McAlay, an outstanding runner, from Boston. He came, competed, and was the only one who could compare with Bell. McAlay won the race and, I believe, won it the next two years, and thereby became, owner of this much coveted trophy. We, however, had nothing to say to Bell for he, as I said before, covered himself with glory and put Newfoundland on the map athletically, showing that we, in Newfoundland, bred the stuff that in the future would have to be reckoned with any time they sent away to Canada, provided they were properly managed and properly trained. In the case of Bell we sent him several weeks ahead of the event to get used to the surroundings, the track, and become acclimatized, all of which is very necessary.

If O'Toole is sent then he should be given a fair show. He is, I presume, in perfect condition. He should be kept so. He should be sent as Bell was sent, a good time ahead of the day of the race to get acclimatized and prepared to put out all that is in him. Then if he is beaten, he is beaten by a better man. That is the fortune of war and no disgrace. When a possible winner takes part in a competition and his shoe string breaks, or his digestion goes wrong, or some idiotic thing like that happens, then those responsible for that state of affairs should be ashamed of themselves, and should not again be trusted with such an important matter. The sending of men to Canada to represent Newfoundland is, in my opinion, a very important matter, one which every man, woman and child in the country, who has red blood in his veins, should be interested in. Why, everybody went crazy over Bell and his associates, and the greatest demonstration ever seen in Newfoundland, up to that time, was made in their honor the night they returned.

I should just love to see O'Toole go to Halifax and run away from the others, and if he does I can promise that he will get such a reception that even the demonstration to Bell will look like a picnic in the wilderness, quite a lonesome affair.

I am sure you will pardon my taking up your space, but I am greatly interested in this matter and hope that this clever young athlete is given a fair show.

MONCTON, Sept. 27.—William Mitchell, of Plaster Rock, was the winner of the Times five mile road race on Saturday afternoon. His time was 27 min. 32 2-5 secs. Roland Sherwood, Amherst, was second, and Silas McLellan, of Noel, last year's winner, was third.
