Next followed a very humorous recitation by Mr. Bretz, entitled "A Lecture on the Month." Miss M. Queen then sang a very beautiful song, "The Old Mission to His Harp." Notwithstanding the excessive heat and the immense crowd, the best order was preserved, and the conduct of the visitors throughout speaks very highly for the inhabitants of Georgetown and vicinity. The Municipal Council of Nassagaweya

The Council met pursuant to adjournment on Monday, 23rd June. Members all present. The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. The Committee on Roads and Bridges presented their report, with a statement of grants made thereon, viz.: \$5 to George Hopkinson for repairing a bridge on the cross road between lots 3 and 4, 1st con. All other applications in the lower part of the Township were recommended to lay over. For the upper part of the Township the grants were as follows, viz.: \$5 to James White for a bridge on the west half of lot 28, 2nd con.; \$40 to William Watson for a bridge and turnpike on the east half lot 28, 2nd con.; \$40 to Nathaniel Reed for a new causeway on crossroad between lots 25 and 26, 5th con.; \$10 to Robert Story to remove pine stumps opposite lot 27, 6th line; \$15 to Matthew Job for repairing a bridge on crossroad between lots 15 and 16, 7th con.; \$10 to David Story for two culverts on the 5th line; \$80 to Joseph Anderson for repairing causeway opposite lot 25, 4th line; \$10 to G. F. Beals for repairing a bridge opposite lot 31, 6th line; \$25 to George Cottrill opposite lot 16, 1st line. Mr. Easterbrook moved, seconded by Mr. Elliott, That the Reeve and Clerk take the earliest opportunity to select six copies of the minutes, &c., of the Council, for the seven years from 1857 to 1873, inclusive, and get the same bound in proper form, for the use of the Township Council for future reference.—Carried. The Committee having examined the town line in conjunction with the Committee of Esqueping, presented their report as follows:—The Committee appointed to examine the town line between the Townships of Nassagaweya and Esqueping, opposite lots 28, 29 and 30, beg leave to report that they met the Committee appointed by the Council of Esqueping, and examined said road, and estimated the cost of opening the same at \$400. We had lot 28 mostly stone and rock, with no timber, lot 29 part rock and stone, and part swamp, requiring a causeway, with sufficient timber for said causeway, lot 30 part swamp, requiring a causeway, and a high hill to cut down, and a hollow to fill up. The only tender offered was for lots 29 and 30, viz., \$100 for cutting down the hill, and \$1 a rod for making the causeway. Your Committee recommend that a petition be presented to the County Council, praying said Council to take action in the matter, if the Council of Esqueping forces the opening of said road. Mr. Elliott moved, seconded by Mr. Easterbrook, That the circular of the Chief Superintendent of Education, with regard to the amendment of the School Law, be laid over till the next meeting of Council.—Carried. Mr. Elliott moved, seconded by Mr. Gillies, That the sum of \$4 be paid to William Kitching for one sheep killed by dogs, being two-thirds value of the same, said claim being duly certified.—Carried. On motion the Council adjourned till the second day of September next. JOHN EASTERBROOK, Tp. Clerk.
