ENGLAND'S CHANCERY COURT.

A thrifty mechanic married a young lady two or three years ago who was a ward in chancery, her little fortune amounting to \$2,000. The costs of the court in settling that sum upon her, by the way, were \$500. Her husband was poor, and applied to the court for permission to use a portion of her funds for the purpose of obeying the doctor's orders.
