URGED THEM TO WORK HARD
London Divines Accept Referendum Under Protest.

Addressed Temperance Meeting in Lobo Township and Emphasized Need of Effort.

Two temperance meetings were held in Lobo township yesterday, one at Coldstream Town Hall in the afternoon and one at Ivan Presbyterian Church at night. The speakers were Rev. Dr. Sowerby, of Talbot Street Baptist Church, and Rev. C. T. Scott, of Dundas Center Methodist Church. The attendance at Coldstream was not large, as many farmers were kept away by farm duties, and two-thirds of the audience were ladies. Mr. T. B. Scott acted as chairman. At night, however, the spacious church at Ivan was crowded to the doors with a most representative attendance of Lobo citizens. The chair was taken by Rev. John Hoste, pastor of the church. Rev. Mr. Scott's address was a clear, calm, temperate review of the situation. Rev. Dr. Sowerby made an impassioned plea for the saving of the boys and girls from the evil attendant upon the traffic in strong drink. Both speakers urged their hearers to work hard to secure a large majority for the referendum at the same time saying that they accepted it under protest, because of certain unfair conditions which they believed it to contain. At the close of the evening meeting a hearty vote of thanks were tendered both speakers.

Jessie MacLachlan to Sing at Toronto.

Jessie MacLachlan, who appears at the New Grand Opera House, London, on Tuesday evening, April 1, is to sing at Toronto on Good Friday night. Toronto Globe says: "Mr. Campbell has received a letter from Government House advising him that it will give the Lieutenant-Governor great pleasure to be named as a patron of the concert to be given on Good Friday night at the Pavilion by Miss Jessie N. MacLachlan. Miss MacLachlan has been very kindly received in all the provinces. In Winnipeg a reception was held in her honor by Lieutenant-Governor McIntosh, and at the close of her second concert there the prima donna was presented with a very valuable umbrella, the handle of which is handsomely finished in gold and ivory. So well pleased was Miss MacLachlan with Miss MacLachlan that they are giving her a benefit concert on her way back from the coast. Last week Mr. Campbell received a letter from the Governor-General's private secretary, intimating that their Excellencies have very much pleasure in giving their patronage to Miss MacLachlan, and that they will be in Ottawa on the 17th April next."

APPOINTED TWO NEW OFFICIALS

Mayor Gratifies Ambition to Have Lady Superintendent.

Miss Mayou, of Philadelphia, Placed in Miss Murray's Position With an Assistant.

The salary expenditure at Victoria Hospital was given another gentle boost yesterday. For some time the mayor has felt that there should be a lady superintendent down there—one who could do some of the work that the medical superintendent has done in the past. Miss Murray, the head nurse, resigned her position at the meeting of the trust yesterday, and this freed the way for the gratification of his worship's desires. Miss McKeljohn, of the Ottawa General Hospital, might have had the lady superintendency had she chosen to accept the offer that the mayor made her a month or so ago, and, since she would not have it, he appointed her nominee, Miss Edith Mayou, of Philadelphia. This was done under protest from Trustee Purdon, who said that he believed—and he knew his opinion to be shared by very many of the physicians of the city—that in Miss Murray they had a very capable head nurse and one whom it might be difficult to improve upon. Nevertheless, her resignation was accepted. With Miss McKeljohn's recommendation, Miss Mayou's application was supported by many eulogistic letters from individuals under whose notice she has come during an extended experience. She was not so modest in her pecuniary demands as Miss Murray has been. Miss Murray's good services were repaid at the rate of \$55 monthly. Miss Mayou would not come at all for less than twice that amount. Nor would she come unless she could bring her own assistant. There is an assistant head nurse at the hospital now, who is excellently qualified for the position. But apparently the deal had to be gone through with, so Miss Mayou's wishes were deferred to. The assistant's monthly check will be drawn for \$20. Miss Mayou wants a new matron—not an ordinary, good housekeeper, but a graduate of the Brooklyn or some other highly-rated school of domestic science, and who could teach the nurses how to cook properly—and this suggestion also will be looked into.

The motion to accept Miss Murray's resignation was couched in complimentary language. It expressed regrets at the loss of her services and wished her well in her future work. The trust decided, also, to complete a verbal agreement that was made when she accepted her present position. It was to assist her in securing further experience in some of the big hospitals over the border. So instead of having her resignation take effect on June 1, it will take effect on July 1, and in the meantime Miss Murray will be granted holidays and an amount sufficient to defray a portion of her expenses. Dr. Balfour will stay past the 1st of April, when he intended quitting, until May. This is in order that he may give his successor a few lessons in the gentle art of managing a hospital. The trust discussed also the changing from the rate of soft coal to hard, the question of holding a concert to raise some pin money, and the complaint of a former patient, who claims that he was physically injured by the negligence of one of the medical staff.
