Commander of Scots Guard Cashiered by War Office. Aldershot, Eng., April 23.—The decision of the war office in the case of officers of the first Battalion of Scots Guards charged with the hazing of Second Lieutenant Clark-Kennedy of the regiment, because he was unable to meet certain regimental expenses, was promulgated Saturday. Reverting Lieutenant-Colonel Cuthbert of his command. Adjutant-Captain R. J. Stracey received a light sentence, and four lieutenants charged with connection in the affair, lose a year's seniority. Clark-Kennedy has left the regiment.

COLORADO MINE DISASTER

Twenty Killed by Explosion in Pit Near Trinidad. Trinidad, Col., April 22.—As the result of a dust explosion in a mine of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company, 40 miles west of Trinidad, today, 22 miners are known to be dead and one is missing. There were 40 men in the mine at the time of the explosion. Seventeen miners who were working 3,700 feet from the entrance escaped uninjured, through another opening. The explosion occurred in two rooms near the bottom of the shaft, and was the result of a windy shot which ignited the dust. The mine gave employment to 180 men. Most of the dead are Italians and Japanese.

Toronto, April 22.—The department of Oriental literature in University College will be strengthened next session by the appointment of Dr. Richard Davidson, to be assistant to Professor J. F. McMurtry, in the place of the late Dr. Morrison. Dr. Davidson is a graduate of the University of Toronto, having distinguished himself as a brilliant scholar in several departments, but especially in Oriental literature. He was also equally distinguished as a theologian when at Knox College. A year ago he was appointed lecturer in Old Testament literature and exegesis in the Presbyterian College, Montreal, and so successful was he that a full professorship would have been offered to him had he chosen to remain. He is at present a lecturer in the pulpit of Knox Church, St. Thomas, with great acceptance.

Paris, April 23.—It is no longer possible to doubt that the next few days will involve a serious crisis in the domestic affairs of France. The industrial agitation is fast assuming revolutionary tendencies, and the problem before the Government has reached a grave phase, which those in authority fully recognize. M. Clemenceau's policy of moderation and pacification, though wisely adopted, is proving a failure, and must soon give place to sterner measures. The ignorant population, which, especially in the north, interpreted its weakness, will soon learn its mistake. The news of riotous demonstrations multiplies daily, and a change to severe repression cannot be much longer delayed. The resort to military force, which will now inevitably be accomplished by serious bloodshed, involves perils to the Government, which the ministers are fully aware, they are disturbed also by information that May Day may be marked by ugly anarchy. The outrages designed to terrorize the population. Every preparation is being made for the dangers which are expected to culminate in a riotous and zealous. The design obviously is to render the Government unworkable on the eve of the election, which will begin on the 6th of next month. The dilemma of the Sarrien ministry is therefore most difficult, and it will require all of M. Clemenceau's great ability to carry the ship of state safely through the storm. Elaborate preparations have been made to meet every emergency with firmness, but without excessive zeal. Thus far M. Clemenceau's bold, sympathetic efforts to calm the agitation have been without effect. The next few days will put to the severest test all qualities of courage and statesmanship.
